COLUMBUS, O., May 13—(AP)—James Newman, 51, a convicted bank robber who became a trusty, walked away from Ohio penitentiary yesterday afternoon, Warden Frank D. Henderson reported today, and a widespread search is under way for him. Newman entered prison in 1931 to serve an indeterminate sentence for a Westerville bank robbery and had been a trusty for four years. Newman appeared twice before the parole board, who continued his period of imprisonment until January, 1947, Henderson said.

# 4-H CLUBS TO PLAN BANNER YEAR AT MEET

Allen-co Groups Assemble in Lima Monday For Session

Anticipating one of the biggest years in their history, 30 Allen-co 4-H clubs will send some 40 representatives here to an organization meeting May 15 to be held at the Lima House hotel.

Club leaders, representing all the 4-H groups of the county, will meet with W. H. Palmer, state 4-H club leader, Miss Eva Kincaid, assistant leader, James F. Warner, Allen-co 4-H supervisor, and other officials of the nation-wide farm youth organization when projects for the coming year will be outlined.

The meeting, sponsored by the Allen-co fair board, will be the kick-off to one of the largest programs ever planned by the county 4-H clubs. Main emphasis will be placed on the organization of the "Victory Project," a plan designed to further farm production. "Instead of asking farm youths to raise two pigs," the Allen-co 4-H leader said, "we're going to ask them to raise six or eight." He explained that the theme "added production" would deal with all phases of agriculture.

During early fall, Warner said, county-wide meetings will be held when certificates of merit will be given to winners of 4-H projects. Awards will be granted on a point system with points based on their special "victory project," salvage of waste materials, sale of war bonds and stamps, and other club activities.

"In spite of all the handicaps that war has brought about, 4-H clubs in this country have remained about normal," Warner stated. "In

fact the local enrollment exceeds that of last year."

In 1943 the Allen-co clubs had slightly more than 500 members. The enrollment for the current year, which closes June 1 and will include 12 boys' clubs and 18 girls' clubs, is expected to exceed 600. The selective service has had little effect on the organizations since few of the members are of draft age, although those between 10 and 20 are eligible for membership.

As tradition has it, a large part of the county fair is usually made up of 4-H activities. This year will be no exception. As plans stand now, 4-H displays are expected at the Bluffton, Delphos, and Columbus Grove fairs and the Lafayette and Allen-co livestock shows.

On the surface, 1944 looks to be a banner year for 4-H clubs in Allen-co. "The national outlook is not as good as ours," Warner disclosed, "but with 35 or 40 projects to choose from we can expect the most from farm youths in our area."

# NEW ALLIED SECRET WEAPON DISPLAYED

LONDON, May 13—(AP)—A new and secret Allied invasion weapon capable of destroying certain enemy emplacements within less than five minutes was demonstrated yesterday by Prime Minister Churchill during an inspection of British troops somewhere in England.

Prime Ministers W. L. Mackenzie King of Canada and Jan Christian Smuts of the Union of South Africa accompanied Churchill.

All looked with the keenest interest as this weapon did its job with spectacular power and then shouting infantry went in to simulate a mopping up charge.
