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# Mother's Day Has Books, Too

### And Free Library Lists Them Today

While biographies of mothers of great men and women are relatively rare, their place in literature is an important one, an examination of books at the Madison Free library reveals.

Of the hundreds of biographical works on the shelves of the city library, a few are primarily tributes to mothers. Sir James Barrie's "Margaret Ogilvy" is a classic example.

Pearl Buck's "The Exile" is the life story of her indomitable parent, and Eve Curie's book, "Madame Curie," is a biography of a noted mother by an already well-known daughter.

The last full-length letter in "Thomas Wolfe's Letters to His Mother" was written the day before Mother's Day, 1938. In it, he wished her "health, happiness and an active life for many years to come," little knowing how soon death was to come to her.

References to mother's love and influence may be found in other types of writing ranging from published speeches to sonnets.
