



The "Lyric Suite" for violin and piano, composed by Alfred Galgin, of the Universily of Wisconsin department of French and Italian, was given a second place award by the National Composers' clinic in its annual contest, winners of which were recently announced.

The suite, according to Galpin's tentative plans, will be performed in Chicago June 15, during the concerts of Composers' Clinic National week, with Georges Szpinal-akl, of the university school of music, at the violin and the composer at the piano. It consists of three movements, "Prelude," "Legend," and "Slavic Dance," of which the first two have already been performed in Madison, at the Union Play circle, by Szpinalski and the composer.

Galpin has studied composition with Vincent d' Indy and Albert Roussel in France, as well as with eminent teachers in this country, and holds a master's degree in composition from Northwestuniversity school of music, awarded him while he was instructor in Romance languages at Northwestern university.
