Canned vegetables-the prevailing "point holiday" will be but temporary, since the 1944 pack of principal canned vegetables-lima beans, snap beens, beets, corn, peas, spinach, and tomatoes-probably will be 20 per cent below 1943 output. Bigger military orders for vegetable juices-chiefly tomato juice-will cut civilian supplies 15 per cent.

Canned fruits --- continued rationing will be necessary to distribute evenly the low civilian supply. Half of the 1944 pack will go to the military, and civilian demand will erase the remaining supply.






