## Home Front Forecasts

Big appetites for little nibbles grow. That's why fishing industry folks are pleased in spite of figures that show the homefolks are eating less fish. Many more inland people are including some fish on their menus, and getting better acquainted with it. That, plus huge amounts of fish served at military mess tables, is expected to build up a larger national taste for fish.

War took the U. S. fish catch down from five billion pounds in 1941, to less than four billion in 1942. More was brought in in 1943. This year's catch is expected to be still larger, but not up to the pre-war five billion mark. More than half such items as canned salmon and sardines are going to feed the armed forces. Consequently U. S. fish-eating, always comparatively low, is now down from a pre-war 13.3 pounds a year to 8.9 pounds per person. The U. S. citizen's pre-war average was slightly above that of the Australian, but way below the 55 pound Japanese average, the Swedish average of 52 pounds, or the Englishman's 35 pound average.

With land lubbers using more fish, and war-time conditions bringing previously unfamiliar varieties to market, such as shark, buffalo fish, and mullet, fishermen are counting on a big post-war fish appetite.

Nutritionists at the Department of Agriculture say increased wartime use of unrationed mineral oil for salad dressings, in hotels and home kitchens, is robbing many people of the valuable carotene in salads, green foods, even butter and cream. When mineral oil is taken with these foods, it can interfere seriously with the body's use of carotene, and vitamin A, the combination that makes for good eyesight, as well as the sunshine vitamin D. Many people use mineral oil in salad dressings as a way to cut down calories. Nutritionists warn that the vitamin loss is more serious than the calories concerned.
