KENTON BANKER MARKS 93RD YEAR AT WORK

KENTON, June 13—One of the oldest active bankers in the United States, Henry W. Gramlich, celebrated his 93rd birthday anniversary at his desk in First National bank, Kenton, June 8, after rounding out 69 years in banking.

His association with banking dates back to May 1, 1875, when he entered the old Hardin Savings bank, as director. He has been most active in banking since that date and at present is vice-president of the First National here, Gramlich who is active in banking waits on customers and often interviews prospective borrowers.

Looking back over his banking career he points out that business principles have always been the same and said that there isn't much difference in the banking business. He stated "We still loan money to an honest, industrious, sober man on his personal note."

The banker said that principal changes have been in lighting, from kerosene to electric and in the elimination of longhand to shorthand and typewriters. Adding machines and mechanical aids also are new.

PUTNAM PICKS WELFARE HEAD

Leona Jones Succeeds Late Bonnie B. Corns in Post

OTTAWA, June 8 — Miss Leona Jones of Ottawa was appointed Putnam-co welfare director of the board of county commissioners late Wednesday afternoon after the commissioners met in conference with the county welfare board.

Miss Jones succeeds Mrs. Bonnie B. Corns who died in her home at Columbus Grove last week. The new director will resign her post in the county Old Age Pension office to accept the new appointment.

The county welfare board recommended Miss Jones for the welfare director appointment and this was followed by the commissioners. Miss Jones will be required to qualify under Civil Service commission regulations as a director but she has had several years of experience as a relief case worker in Cleveland.

Mrs. Corns had served as head of the Putnam-co relief and welfare departments for the last decade. She established the coordinated welfare department which served as a model for others throughout Ohio.

The county welfare department includes general relief, aid to dependent children, aid to the blind and aid to crippled children. While the case load is much smaller than during the depression years, the permanent welfare cases still require the expenditure of several thousand dollars annually.

VERDICT GIVEN FOR DEFENDANT

KENTON, June 8 — Judge Arthur D. Tudor directed the jury to return a verdict in favor of the defendant, the Fisher Dairy and Cheese Co. of Wapakoneta in a damage suit of Carl Moore of near Kenton, seeking \$15,500 for injuries he said he suffered in an automobile-truck collision on State Route 67, March 10, 1943.

Judge Tudor ruled that the driver of the truck was an independent milk hauler and that the company was not liable for damages, it was reported.

Moore was seeking \$15,500 for injuries and \$500 for damage to his car. Mrs. Moore, who also was in the car at the time of the accident, still has a suit pending for \$10,000 for personal injuries.

DRAFT CALLS FOR JUNE SAID REDUCED IN PUTNAM
