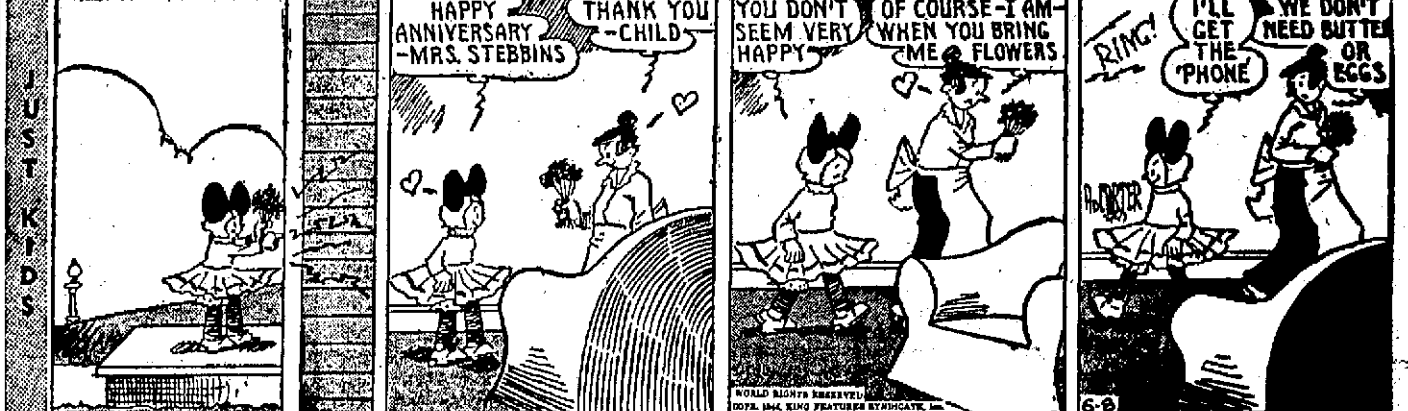
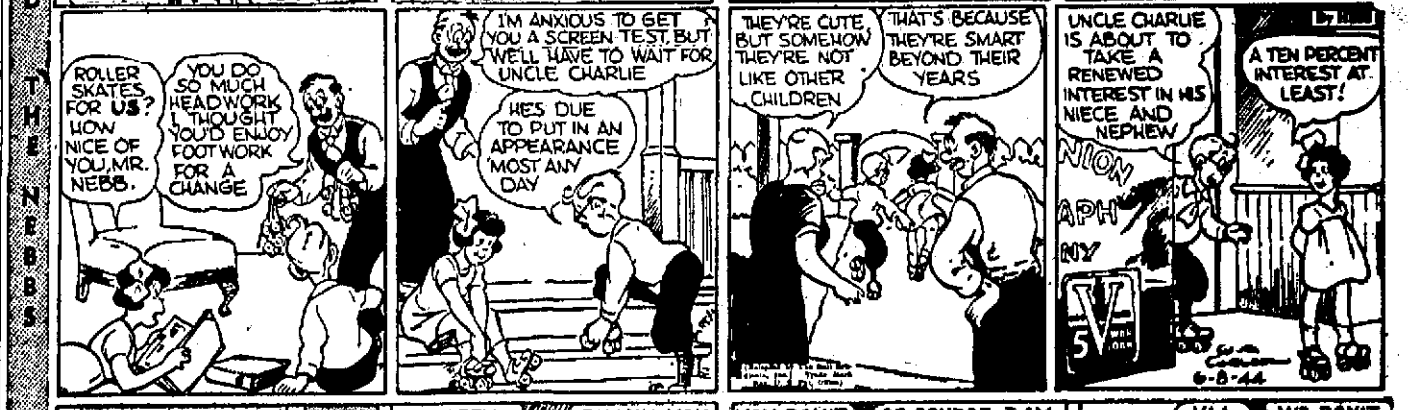

**AZTECS MADE "MUSIC" WITH LOG DRUMS AND CONCH SHELLS**

The Aztecs of old Mexico were fond of music—or of what they looked upon as music. If we may judge by the instruments they used, the sounds probably would have seemed more like noise than music to our ears. Yet it is likely that the Aztecs enjoyed the sounds well enough.

Drawings made by Aztecs long ago show different kinds of musicians. In one drawing a man is beating a log drum. Such a drum was made by putting a hollow in a log and cutting two strips of skin across.

The beating was done with wooden sticks which had rubber over the tips. A second Aztec drawing shows a man beating a kettle-drum. It is in the shape of a turtle shell, or blew through a conch to make a trumpet sound. A conch is a shell found in the sea. Large spiral shells of this kind, open at one end, can be blown so as to make a mighty blast. Whistles were sometimes made of clay, and little copper bells were shaken. The bells were something like those used during old-fashioned sleigh-rides.

Another musician was shown playing a flute which bulged out in an odd manner. The man blew at one end, while he kept stopping up holes, or setting them free, with his fingers.

The Aztecs also made music in other ways. Sometimes they beat on a turtle shell, or blew through a conch to make a trumpet sound. A conch is a shell found in the sea. Large spiral shells of this kind, open at one end, can be blown so as to make a mighty blast. Whistles were sometimes made of clay, and little copper bells were shaken. The bells were something like those used during old-fashioned sleigh-rides.

Songs were sung while the Aztecs danced around bonfires, or

after they were through with a feast. Such songs were usually about war or religion, but sometimes an Aztec youth tried to win the favor of a young woman by his singing. That probably was done when there were not many people around.

of their famous song writers had the name of "Nezahualcoyotl," meaning "Starring Coyote." This man did not starve, however. He lived to the age of 80 years!
