ALL-IN-ONE SALAD PLATE Fill 4 lettuce cups with mixture of 2 cups chopped boiled ham, 1 cup diced celery, 2 hard-cooked eggs, chopped, 2 tablespoons chopped pineapple, 1/2 teaspoon paprika, 1/2 teaspoon salt. Place one cup in center of cold plate; surround with lettuce cups filled with asparagus tips, baby beets, green peas, cauliflower flowerettes, sliced tomatoes. Pass Thousand Island dressing. Serves 4. With the above salad meal serve homemade refrigerator rolls, hot from the oven, and strawberry shortcake with whipped cream, and coffee—piping hot.

SECOND PRIZE and RECIPE MRS. LUTHER A. MOORMAN Route 2, Spencerville, O. COLD PLATE LUNCH 2 green peppers, 1 1/2 ounce bottle pickled onions, 3 tomatoes, 12 tiny sweet pickles, 1 5 to 6 ounce can Vienna sausage, 6 slices American cheese, 6 slices boiled ham, 1 1/2-ounce can pork luncheon meat, 6 sliced corned beef, 1 sliced cucumber. Remove tops and seeds from peppers. Fill with drained onions. Roll up into tomatoes, drain well and fill with pickles. Place peppers and tomatoes on one side of large platter. Brown Vienna sausage, cut cheese slices cornerwise. Arrange sausages, meats and cheese on the platter. Garnish with water-cress and sliced cucumber slices. Serves 6 to 8.

THIRD PRIZE and RECIPE F. L. BROWN, P. O. Box 373, Lima, O. MIDSUMMER GARDEN PLATE 10 medium carrots, 8 ears of corn, 1 summer squash, 8 slices big bologna, cut medium. Cook range covered, in small amount of boiling, salted water 15 to 25 minutes; cook corn in small amount of boiling, salted water 6 to 12 minutes. Steam squash whole. Cut in five sections. Sprinkle carrots with green onion snips. Brush vegetables with butter. Arrange platter by placing four slices bologna at extreme right and left of plate, two ears of corn at sides of bologna, five carrots at top and bottom placed out square in heart shape, and fill in center; garnish with parsley, serves six to eight. Save and use vegetable cooking liquors in soup, gravies, and vegetable salads. For a grand summer dinner serve this garden plate with squares of hot peach short cake with a dash of cinnamon (when you mix cake).

FOURTH PRIZE and RECIPE MRS. CHARLES WEXLER, 1171 W. Wayne-st., Lima, O. COLD PLATE LUNCH 1 medium-sized tomato, tuna fish salad, potato chips or saltines. Take one medium-sized tomato, hollow out inside well, mix excess tomato pulp with tuna fish, celery and mayonnaise. Refill tomato with salad, top with mayonnaise and serve on lettuce leaf. Serve with potato chips or saltines and olives.

FIFTH PRIZE and RECIPE MRS. M. G. LUGENBILL, 1153 1/2 Illinois, Bluffton, O. COLD PLATE LUNCH On a bed of lettuce place a slice of pineapple. Cover with one-half cup cottage cheese, seasoned with salt, pepper and smoothed with cream. Cover with another slice of pineapple and top with a spoonful of the cheese. Arrange slices of avocado, grapefruit sections, tomato wedges, and strips of lean broiled bacon, attractively around pineapple. Serve with French dressing. Yield: 1 serving.

SIXTH PRIZE and RECIPE MRS. H. L. EBBESKOTTE, 1171 W. Wayne-st., Lima, O. COLD PLATE LUNCH Serve nut and raisin sandwiches with tomato slices and potato chips. Nut and raisin sandwiches 1/2 cup seeded raisins, 1/2 cup chopped nuts, Juice of half a lemon, Buttered Graham or white bread. Chop the raisins finely or pass them thru a meat chopper with the shelled nuts, blend smoothly and moisten with the lemon juice. Spread between slices of well-buttered bread.
