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

taurant" to the traditional 3 R's. The school lunch program should be more than a meal for children, it should be part of a food lesson to carry home to the family, in the opinion of Rep. George E. Outland, of California. Mr. Outland is sponsoring a bill to put the school lunch program under the office of Education, instead of the Department of Agricul-"Food surpluses are a Depart-

ment of Agriculture matter. They should certainly continue to be used wherever possible in the school lunch program," Mr. Outland says, "but any program which deals primarily with the children should be under the Ofvege- fice of Education. The school lunch program is an educational job, not an agricultural one."

Mr. Outland has the Parent-Teacher's-assn and other groups eight. Save and use vegetable cooking liquors in soups. gravies and vegetable solders. 

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
