

Mystery Programs Feature Thursday's Ether Waves

A middleweight boxer meets with murder in the National Safety Council's mystery drama, "It's Murder," Thursday at 10:15 p. m., EWT, over WJZ.

In the story, "Killer Roberts" gets killed in the ring, but not by a blow from his opponent. The mystery is solved by Rex Starr, retired actor and amateur criminologist, and his Broadway-columnist niece, Joan Adams.

"The Case of the Chinese Puzzle Box" gives Charlie Chan's Number One son a chance to help his father in no small way. Chan, played by Ed Begley, is engaged to find a real El Greco and the man who caused it to disappear. A murdered man leaves a puzzle box clue and Number One Son Chan (Leon Janney) is right on the spot—Thursday, (WEAF, 7:30 p. m., EWT).

It was a wonder that the man himself was not knocked for a ghoulish when he observed a weird figure carrying a coffin vanish right before his eyes. Then the figure reappeared and tried to murder the observer in the amazing incident described by Marvin Mueller on the WJZ's "Coronet Storyteller" program, Thursday at 9:55 p. m., EWT. While you picked and chose in your market's new abundance of unrated food, farm group leaders met in Washington and predicted uncertain food futures.

At a session on "Setting America's Dinner Table" at the recent Rural-Urban Women's conference, farm leaders presented statistical evidence of the economic problem faced by agriculture. Cost of producing eggs, their figures indicated, was more than 10 cents a dozen over the farmer's return.

Dairy production has held up, too. In spite of previous dire predictions, January to April production beat last year's. There are now more dairy cows on farms than there were last year.

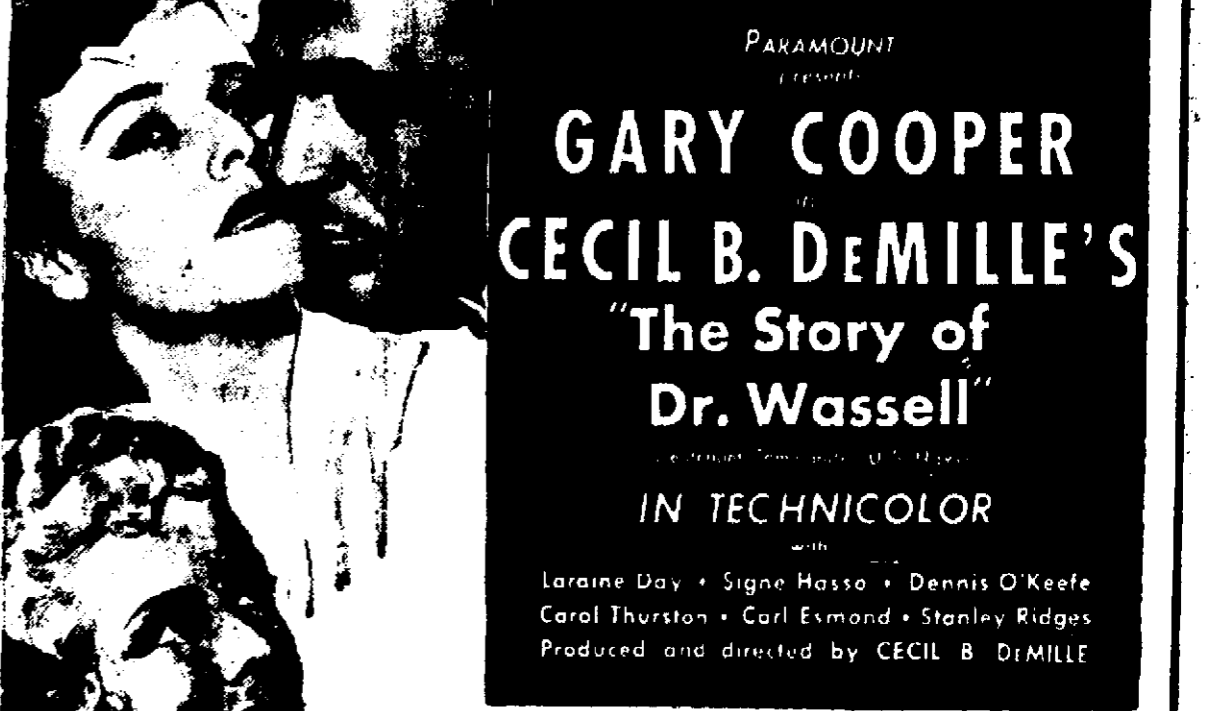
