



Uncle Ray's Corner

Trouser Custom Old, But Most Ancient Men Wore Skirts

If you travel around the world, one thing you will notice is the dress of the people. Perhaps you will know that men wear skirts in some countries, but very likely you will be "shocked" when you see them really doing that.
That is about the way I felt

when I reached Egypt. The walters at my hotel were long robes, or we might call them dresses. Some of the men on the streets of Cairo also had the same garb

The customs of the Orient have changed in modern times. Many men in Asia now wear "western dress," including trousers. The Romans in Italy used to wear "togas." These were very


