## Uncle Ray's Corner

Invading Tribesmen Mixed Styles With Those of Romans

Fifteen hundred years ago, Goths and other German tribesmen were sweeping over southern and southwestern Europe. The year 476 is called the year in which the Roman empire fell, but the empire had been breaking to pieces before that time.

Into France came the Franks. Into England came the Angles, Saxons and Jutes. Into Italy came the Lombards and others.

After winning power in those parts of Europe, the invaders settled down. Many married with people who had lived there before. One interesting thing which happened in the next few hundred years was the "mixing" of costumes of men.

The invaders brought in long trousers, and most people in the Roman empire had not seen such clothing before. The invaders adopted some clothing customs of the natives, and at the same time gave the natives some of their own customs.

In England Anglo-Saxon men kept their rude trousers, but wore tunics over them. The tunic often had full-length sleeves, and usually hung down to the knees, like a short skirt. Anglo-Saxon women of that time wore dresses which reached clear to the ground. It was the custom of Anglo-Saxon men and boys to bind their trousers to the leg, from ankle to knee, with narrow strips of cloth or leather.

When the Normans reached England, they brought in a custom of men wearing tunics which reached to the ankles. That was the style for Norman nobles, but the peasants in England kept their short-tunic fashion.

When the year 1200 rolled around, many English peasants wore long trousers. Their tunics were hardly more than shirts with
