WASHINGTON- (U.P.) -The United States, now harvesting the greatest wheat crop in its history, will have more wheat for civilians' food next year than was available in pre-war years, the War Food Administration (WFA) predicted Friday.

Despite tremendous demands by the armed services, lend-lease, and industrial users, the 1944

British Wince wheat supply will provide civilians with 227 pounds per person But Hold Fire -or 1 pound more than last year and 6 pounds more than during the five years ending in 1939.

Carry-over Provided WFA said that a total supply of 1,500,000 bushels as protection against any possible short crop

The agency reported that 118,-000,000 bushels will be allocated for industrial purposes-primarily for the manufacture of industrial alcohol-compared with 85,000,000 bushels this year. The increase is due to an expected continued tight corn supply, a WFA spokesman said.

WFA said about 100,000.000 bushels have been allocated for livestock feed during July, August, and September. However, only 140,000,000 bushels will be set aside for the remaining nine months of the year. This smaller alloument for feeding between September and next July was based on the expected heavy reof livestock numbers, WFA said.

65,000,000 for Relief About 118,000,000 bushels will meet military needs and lend-lease demands, while 65,000,000 bushels will be held in reserve as relief for liberated areas, WFA said.

The year's total supply represents an estimated record production of 1,128,000,000 bushels. over stocks of 350,000,000 bushels, and expected imports of from 50,000,000 to 75,000,000

Total consumption was forecast at 1,115,000,000 bushels compared with an average peacetime digestion of 677,000,000 bushels.


