# Release Whisky, Distillers Asked

McCarran Committee Charges 'Hoarding' WASHINGTON-(U.P.)-A senate

committee investigating the liquor shortage called upon the nation's distillers today to show "good faith" by releasing more bonded whisky as a result of the current 30-day "liquor holiday" permitting manufacture of beverage alcohol. In a comprehensive report covering the second phase of its investigations, the committee, headed by Sen. Pat McCarran, (D-Nev.), said that "hoarding" by the distillers was as much to blame for the shortage as any illicit actions by R other segments of the public.

"It is obvious," the report-charged, "that the large distillers wish to retain substantial stocks of aged whiskies in their bonded warehouses until after the war so that they will be in a better position to command higher prices and pense of an unsuspecting public The "liquor holiday," granted recently by the war production board, extends through the month

The report accused large distilas contributing \$49.50 each were substituting inferior brands at, in W. A. Walker, W. K. Bakke, L. J. many instances, higher prices. Through a "self-rationing" sys-

tem which the industry adopted after the stoppage of whisky pro-
