Co. H, a machinegun company, is the first Lima unit since the National Guard left this city for Camp Shelby, Miss., in Oct., 1940, before worldwide hostilities actually had been declared.

First Refugees Are Brought To American Camp

HOBOKEN, N. J., Aug. 5—(INS)—A group of 984 refugees from Europe, who landed at Hoboken last night on an Army transport, found sanctuary today in Oswego, N. Y., where they will live until after the war.

The passengers who range in age from two days old to 80 years were met at the dock by members of the War Relocation Authority. They came from Italian camps. The ship which brought them also carried American wounded and one small passenger, a 9-months old girl, who did not live to reach this country. She will be buried in America.

All were given medical examinations and also some were in ill health and some infirm with old age they were permitted to board the train which carried them to their new home.

Miss Ruth Gruber, a field representative of the Department of the Interior who made the trip said the refugees were a cross section of every type now pouring into Italy. There were Jews, Roman Catholics, some of the Greek orthodox faith and protestants. Religious services were held for all faiths on board.

Some spoke a little English and were loud in their thanks for having escaped the control of Hitler. Most of them expect to work in their Oswego camp but the majority wish to return to their native lands once they have been permanently liberated.

Dr. Rafael Margulius, 59, formerly a lieutenant colonel in the Yugoslav medical corps said: "I thank the Lord I have been saved from Hitler and the Gestapo. From the bottom of my heart, I thank the Americans, the British and the Russians who have given us freedom." He added that his one ambition is to take back American culture to his own country.

As the new arrivals were preparing to make their homes in Oswego, the National Refugee Service was attempting to communicate with their relatives.

DAMAGE SUIT ASKS \$5,177

Negligence Is Charged In Traffic Mishap
