Military Entrainment First Here In About Four Years

LIMA GUARD TO

LEAVE SUNDAY

FOR OHIO CAMP

Lima's State armory on Shawnee-rd was buzzing with activity early Sunday for the first time in about four years, as a local military unit prepared to go into camp.

Co. H. Fourth Inf. Regt., Ohio State Guard, was to go to Camp Light at Zaleski, O., early Sunday by bus which was to clear the area at 6 a. m. The group was scheduled to arrive at its destiunation in the hills of Vinton-co about 11 a. m. EWT). Slow time is official at the camp.

Full strength of three officers and 60 enlisted men climbed into the buses at the early hour with an 185-mile ride before them. Upon arrival in camp, the schedule calls for "making camp" on Sunday preparatory to "getting down to business' under regular schedule Monday morning.

Tho members of the Lima company are fully uniformed and have practically all of their field equipment, no arms have been issued. It was explained that shortage and late arrival of rifles, machineguns, sub-machineguns and shotguns would require that they be issued in camp.

Field training in camp includes **ressions** in close and extended order drill, interior guard duty, rifle marksmanship including firing on the camp 200-yard range, riot duty, and instruction in machine and sub-machineguns, shotguns, use of gas and other allied subjects.




