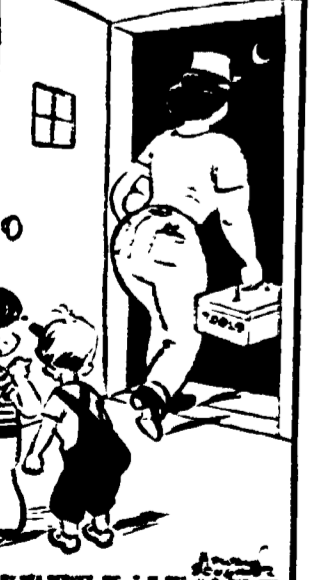

Million Extra Farm Workers To Be Needed

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9 (INS)—One million extra farm workers will be needed in September to meet demands of the heavy 1944 crop harvest, the War Food Administration disclosed today.

At the same time, WFA said that its previous estimate of the need for an additional 4,000,000 farm hands during this year was being borne out.

"During the first six months, 300,000 farmers requested additional workers thru 12,000 county and community farm placement offices," WFA said.

"This resulted in 1,250,000 replacements, of which 600,000 were made in June alone."
WFA labeled the following states as farm labor shortage areas for August:
North Dakota—30,000 workers needed to help harvest a record wheat crop of 137,000,000 bushels.
Alabama—15,000 to help stack peanuts.
Oregon—40,000 to harvest hops.
New Jersey—6,800 to harvest potatoes and tomatoes.
Colorado—5,200 for the fruit and vegetable harvest.
Virginia—3,900 for the peach crop.

PLANT WILL GET A FOURTH STAR

PITTSBURGH, Aug. 9—Presentation of a fourth star for Army-Navy "E" flag of the East Pittsburgh and Trafford Works of Westinghouse Electric & Manufacturing Co. will highlight the 54th Westinghouse picnic to be held Saturday at Kennywood park.
The star, emblem signifying that the plant has maintained excellence of production for the past six months period, will be presented by Lt. Comdr. E. W. McKinley, U. S. Navy (Ret.), assistant to the inspector of Naval material for the Pittsburgh district. The flag and its four stars now signify the plant's four-year commendation for production over a continuous period of two and a half years.
Acceptance of the four-starred flag will be made by T. I. Phillips, company vice president, who will turn it over to labor-management committees representatives, J. W. Schaffer, works industrial relations manager, T. J. Fitzpatrick, president Local 601, U. E. R. M. W. A. (CIO) and Lee Bolens, president of the Association of Westinghouse Salaried Employees.

MINE TOMB BAY BE REACHED BY MONDAY

BELLAIRE, O., Aug. 9—(INS)—Drilling at the fastest rate in Ohio's mining history, rescue crews today set next Monday as their goal to open the tomb of 66 miners, trapped a month ago when fire swept the Powhatan mine.
The drillers have cut thru more than 900 feet of the Fishhook Hollow slope above the mine, and have about 470 feet to go. They have been cutting thru at a rate of about 100 feet a day.
A temporary moque has been set up at the scene, and when the bodies of the victims are recovered they will be taken there for identification.

GOP Has Hope Of Capturing Senate Control

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9 (UP)—Three members of the Republican senate campaign committee predicted today that the GOP definitely will win five new senate seats in the November election, and stands a good chance to win six others to gain majority control of the upper house.

Based on their predictions on confidential reports from political observers in the field, Sons, E. V. Robertson, Wyo., Owen Brewster, Me., and Chapman Revercomb, W. Va., pointed out that if the Republicans win those 11 seats, they will be present to 49, a majority of 1, giving them the right to reorganize the senate and take over all committee chairmanships.

Robertson, Brewster and Revercomb said states virtually certain to name Republicans include New Jersey, Iowa, Indiana, Illinois and Idaho.
In the other six states, the three senators felt that the Republicans stood a good chance of winning, and an even better chance if Gov. Thomas E. Dewey carried them for the national ticket. They said those states were Missouri, Utah, New York, California, Washington and Kentucky, the "fighting ground where the signs are very favorable." Senate Majority Leader Alben W. Barkley of Kentucky is opposed by Republican Commonwealth Attorney James Parks; the state administration went Republican two years ago.

GIVEN \$414,000, WOMAN APPEALS FOR \$1,400,000

GREENFIELD, O., Aug. 9—(INS)—Alto awarded \$414,000 in cash by Highland co common pleas court an appeal was on file today by Mrs. Elizabeth Ann Stewart of Los Angeles seeking the \$1,400,000 estate of her late uncle.
Three thousand shares of stock in the American Pad and Textile Co. of Greenfield were left Mrs. Stewart in a will of the late Arthur E. McClain. Three other wills were found, however, and because probate court was unable to determine which was the latest, it awarded the estate to McClain's brother, Edward.
The case was reopened by Mrs. Stewart upon Edward's death which occurred in 1936. Yesterday common pleas court ruled she could not recover the stock but should be paid its cash value, fixed at \$144,000 from the Edward McClain estate, but Mrs. Stewart appealed the decision.

CLEVELAND SCHOOL DEBT IS PAID OFF

CLEVELAND, Aug. 9—(INS)—The Cleveland board of education can look the whole world in the face today for it has paid all of its debts—right down to the last nickel.
When the president of the board, Alfred A. Benesch, handed a check for \$506,120.73 to Cuyahoga county Auditor John A. Zangerle he was paying a debt, part of which dated back to the gay nineties. It included special assessments plus interest, paving, grading, water and other services.

PONTIAC, Mich., Aug. 9 (INS)—A 23-year-old steel worker, discharged from the Army for a brain injury, confessed early today to Oakland co Prosecutor Donald C. Noggle that he choked his fiancee to death during a lovers quarrel.
The youth, Ernest Parsons, appeared in the Davison precinct station in Detroit last night and announced "I killed my sweetheart." He then led police to a heavily wooded ditch at the Oakland co intersection where the body of dark-haired Luella M. Parfitt, 19, was found.
Parsons said the girl had refused to marry him and told him she never wanted to see him again. "My mind went to pieces and then it happened," he said. "Everything went black. I started to choke her."
When I came to my senses, blood was spouting from her mouth. I tried to stop it and revive her but there was no use. So I drove to the nearest police station. I knew about to get help."
