Rabbitry Here Wins Fair Honors
The Wisconsin Rabbitry, 4239 Beverly rd., Madison, was awarded second place in the best display of rabbits in an entire class of 650, according to a report received today from the Wisconsin State Fair Assn. With 23 entries, the Madison breeders won 18 awards, among which was the best of breed ribbon for the Flemish display, all colors included. First place award for best display was won by an out of state rabbitry.
The New Zealand white class had the largest entries, with 166 animals, out of which the Wisconsin rabbitry won 11 awards with 17 entries. In the Flemish class they won five awards with four entries.
The rabbitry's winnings included four firsts, two seconds, three thirds, two fourths, one fifth, three sixths and two sevenths in addition to the best of breed award and second best display.

Uncle Ray's Corner
SCOTT'S SCRAP BOOK By R. J. Scott
Jane Austen Failed To Find Publisher For Her First Novel
A hundred and sixty-nine years ago, a seventh child was born in the family of the Rev. George Austen, who lived in the county of Hampshire, England. The child was a girl and was to become a writer of note. Yet she was to be known to the general public only after she died.
Gifted with a bright mind but a not-too-pretty face, little Jane took her place in the Austen household. Mrs. Austen was happy to have "a playmate" for Cassandra, Jane's slightly older sister. For a time during her childhood, Jane went to a school kept by a "Mrs. Latourneille." We are told that this lady was "old and stout, with a cork leg," and knew very little about how to teach.
No doubt it was lack of a good school, close at hand, which led the Reverend Austen to take his two smallest daughters from school and teach them himself.
In those days, the homes of ministers were likely to have far more books than those of other folks. Jane and Cassandra read hundreds of the books. Among the subjects they studied were French and Italian.
Jane read the books, but there were a number which she cared little about. She found too many "moralis" in some of them, and the novels often made her laugh. Her laughter arose from the fact that the novels were far from being true to life.
During her teens, Jane did a bit of writing of her own. She wrote verses and short notes. One day she saw an item in a newspaper about a Miss Gill who had married a Mr. Gell. The change of an "n" to an "e" in Miss Gill's name amused her, so she wrote this verse:
"Of Eastbourne Mr. Gell
"From being perfectly well
"Became dreadfully ill
"For the love of Miss Gill."
So he said with some sighs,
"I'm the slave of your eyes.
"Oh! restore if you please
"By accepting my case!"
At the age of 20, Jane Austen started writing a book and finished it in 10 months. This was "Pride and Prejudice." The young author was not able to find a company which would publish it.
