

Piqua Ace Honored On "Words At War" Program

"One Man Air Force," the story of Capt. Don S. Gentle, as told to Ira Wolfert, will be heard on "Words at War" Tuesday (WEAF, 8:30 p. m. EST). Gerald Holland has adapted the book for radio.

Gentle, the Piqua boy who has shot down more than 30 planes, a record which is tops for any American in two wars, bunched next to War Correspondent Wolfert at a British Air Base. There he told the author the story of his life. The radio drama emphasizes his boyhood as that of a typical American lad who wanted to be a flier and shows what makes this type of youth equal to and often superior to professional fighters.

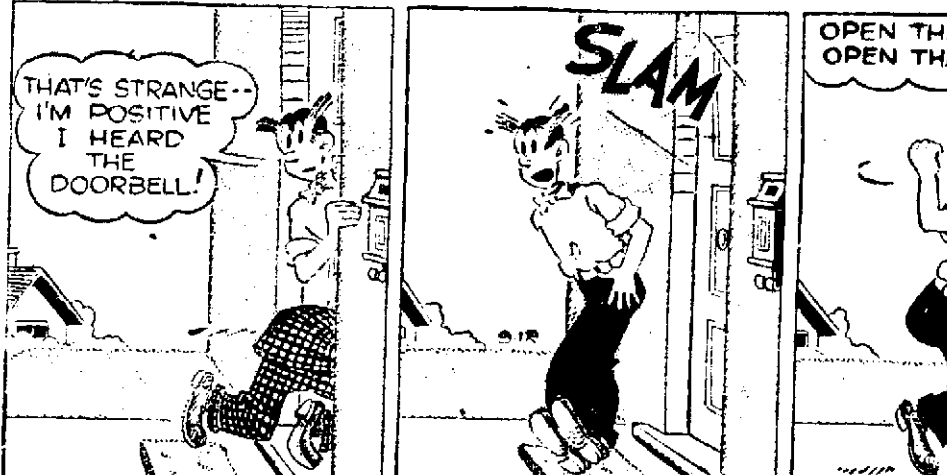

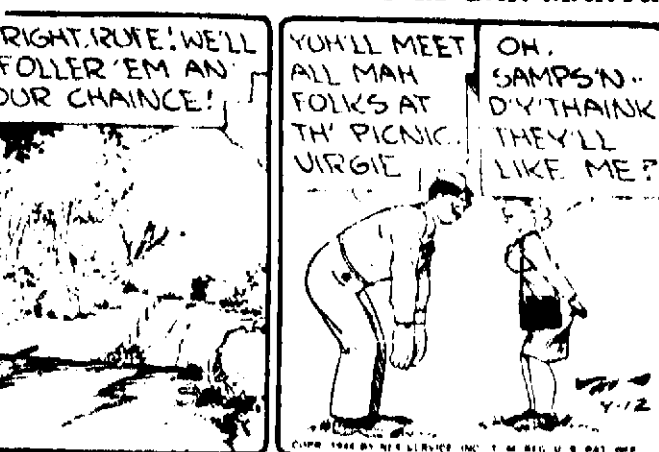

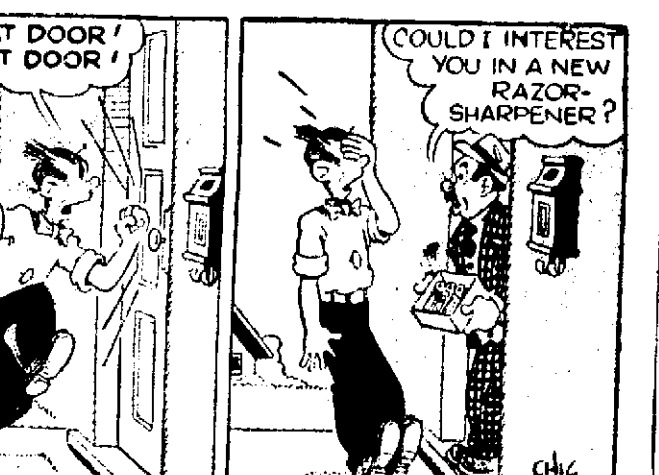
