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Uncle Ray's Corner SCOTT'S SCRAP BOOK By R. J. Scott. Members of the Chinese Beggars Guild furnish music for funerals and weddings alike. The viol was much used during the middle ages. It was the forerunner of the violin and its kindred instruments. The violin grew out of old instruments known as 'fiddles,' 'viols' or 'violins.' Even at the present day, violins are called 'fiddles' at times. We also have a large-sized violin known as a 'viola.' Eight hundred years ago, a handwritten copy of the Bible was usually had 46 strings across the frame. Since these are of different sizes, they give off different sounds when twanged. If a harp is played with the music can be very pleasing. A musical instrument often has both strings and a sounding box. What kind of sounding box was first used? We cannot be sure of the answer to that question but a large, rounded shell may have served the purpose. Another early sounding box may have been a gourd with part of one side cut away. It is possible to make a crude musical instrument by stretching strings across an open part of a gourd. Among modern instruments with sound boxes are guitars, mandolins and violins. The player may twang the strings with his fingers, or he may use a bow. The modern violin bow has just about 100 long hairs stretched from one end to the other, but the first musical bow probably had only one string. The violin grew out of old instruments known as 'fiddles,' 'viols' or 'violins.' Even at the present day, violins are called 'fiddles' at times. We also have a large-sized violin known as a 'viola.' Eight hundred years ago, a handwritten copy of the Bible was made with a picture of a man playing a viol with a queer-looking bow. The viol has only one string, and is almost exactly like a bow used to shoot arrows. A number of other old pictures also show that such bows were used to make music during the Middle Ages.
