THE RISE AND FALL OF RUDOLPH GAJDA — Gajda was a native of the Austrian monarchy where he was born in 1892. He served in an Austrian regiment during the beginning of the World War, but deserted to the Montenegrins in 1911 and found his way to Russia, where he fought with the Czechoslovakian Legion against the Central Empires. With the advent of the Soviets he allied himself with the White Russian armies under General Kolchak, whose daughter he married. In 1918, when only 26 years old, he was promoted to major general. In 1920, he returned to Czechoslovakia, which country confirmed him in the rank of Lieutenant General and sent him to school in France to perfect him in military knowledge. Having risen to chief of the general staff, he was court-martialed in 1926 and convicted of high treason. By sentence of the court-martial, he was reduced to the rank of a private, and dismissed from the army.

OUTPUT BOOST BY BETHLEHEM IS REVEALED

BETHLEHEM, Pa., Sept. 16 — (AP) Bethlehem Steel Co. reported today that steel forgings totaling 951,000 tons were turned out from Jan. 1, 1941, to Jan. 1, 1942, with production increases ranging as high as 119 per cent for 1942 over 1941.

The company said that in 1942 steel forgings shipped totaled 411,000 tons, an increase of 25.5 per cent over the 1941 total. The figures were approved by the Navy.

Gun forgings shipped last year totaled 21,200 tons, an increase of 119 per cent over 1941, the company reported. Armor shipments in 1942 were 40,000 net tons, a 31 per cent increase over the previous year. The company boosted its production of airplane engine cylinders 83 per cent last year, turning out 2,500,000 forgings, and furnishing 55 to 60 per cent of the country's requirements in 1942.

The 1942 output of 75 and 90-mm projectiles reached 1,000,000 pieces while ship and ship machinery forgings totaled 150,350 tons, a rise of 74 per cent over 1941. The company shipped 732,000 tough projectile forgings in 1942, an 81 per cent increase over 1941.

The company perfected a new technique for production of heat-treated gun barrel forgings for 30 and 50 calibre guns in 1942 and the following year shipped 2,115,000 such forgings, it said. Other shipments reported for the 1941-42 period include: heat-treated and machined armor plate, 65,000 tons; torpedo air flasks, 18,200; three to 10-inch projectiles, 2,735,000; small gun barrels, 2,582,000; airplane engine cylinders, 4,545,000; railroad and mine cars fabricated, 18,800; wire rope, 100,000 tons; heat-treated and machined gun forgings, 37,800.
