BOARD ADOPTS TAXATION RATES AT ST. MARYS

(Special To The Lima News) ST. MARYS, Oct. 27.—The school board adopted a resolution approving the rates of taxation for the St. Marys city school district as submitted by the county taxing commission. It includes 3.60 mills inside the 10-mill limitation for current expenses, 1.80 mills outside for bond retirement and three mills for current expenses, making a total of 8.47 mills for the schools.

The proposed tax rate of 8.40 mills for the schools is the lowest in years. There has been a steady decrease since 1938 when the rate was 10.80 mills.

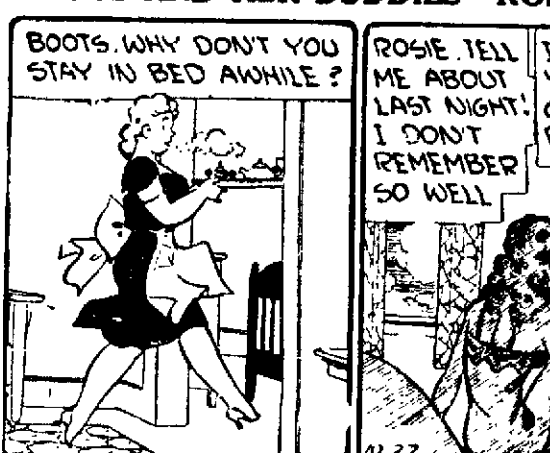

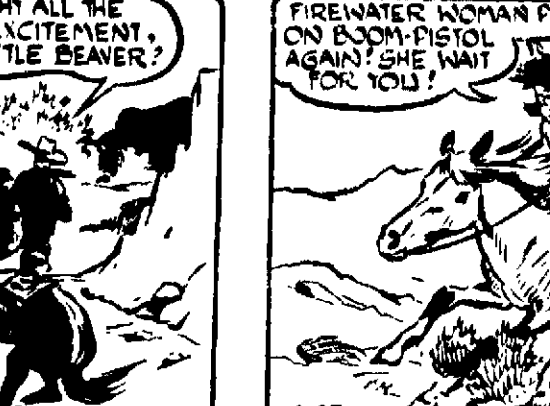
