BOOST CEILINGS ON NEW HOMES

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28.—(AP)—Higher sales and rental ceilings on new houses, ranging up to \$8,000 purchase price and \$65 a month rental in high cost areas, were authorized today by the National Housing Administration and the War Production Board.

The action, coupled with the removal of all occupancy restrictions, applies to NHA's so-called "H-2" housing program which was announced in July but stalled from the start because builders were not interested in undertaking home construction at the lower price limit then prevailing.

Upwards of 80,000 new units of "larger and better quality housing" are expected to result from the liberalized rules. Many will be built to sell for under \$8,000 because NHA will set lower ceilings, it was stated, in areas where less money is required to get needed homes built.

SHE MAKES OWN LINENS FROM HOME GROWN FLAX

DEERWOOD, Minn., Oct. 28.—(UP)—Mrs. Robert Obers devotes a half acre of ground to flax, and sees the product thru all processes of making fine linen fabrics.

Mrs. Obers, who learned about spinning and weaving as a child, started growing the fiber six years ago. She hand-pulls the flax when it reaches the right stage. Then she ties it in bundles and submerges it in a tank or lake until it has rotted so that the fibers can be removed from the core.

Kiln drying is the next step, followed by the breaking, scotching, hackling and brushing to separate the fiber from chaff. The flax now is ready to go into the spinning and weaving of such articles as aprons, runners, bed linens and towels.

Production of linen fiber in the Deerwood area has not been tried on a commercial scale, but it may be, for E. F. Worst, widely known flax authority, pronounces the climate comparable to that of Ireland and Belgium for growing of long linen fibers.

JAPS OFFERED LITTLE COMFORT IN SEA DEFEAT

Lifeline Now Severed, Nation Faces Direct Assault From Yankers

They say it's an ill wind that blows nobody good, but the only comfort the Japanese can get out of the Yankee hurricane which they ran into off the Philippine archipelago is that their disaster was no worse.

With more facts about this historic engagement at hand the story is far from complete, but now can say with assurance that the Nipponese have suffered not only a major defeat but a decisive one. It's decisive in that it guarantees the Allies success in the great and difficult battle of the Philippines. And since those islands are the key to the war in the Pacific we know that this conflict will be greatly shortened.

Japan's navy, which was estimated to total about 200 ships before the current engagement, has been crippled. Its back has been broken by the heavy loss in capital ships.

The Japs lost more than 27 important ships, how many more remains to be confirmed. These included 10 battleships which were taken by the Navy. Estimated estimates as representing two-thirds of all Japan had of these leviathan ships.

It may help us to assess the full significance of the catastrophe that has overtaken the Mikado's navy if we recall what happened to us at Pearl Harbor in 1941. The bigdons from the Orient sank or damaged 18 of our warships, and eight of these were battleships. That pretty well hamstringing us in the Pacific for a long time, and vastly contributed to the enemy's success in overrunning strategic islands.

Well, that's the misfortune multiplied which now has been handed back to the Japanese. But their position is desperate, for they haven't the resources to recover from the blow as did the United States. They no longer are capable of facing the American naval forces for once the Pacific fleet has several times the numerical strength of the best that Japan can muster. Not only that, but the British admiralty announced the other day that it had started to move into the orient a huge fleet capable of giving battle to the entire Japanese navy—and this was before the Japs suffered disaster off the Philippines.

That chance has the Japanese to face of all this? I think only expect it to pull out of the South China sea and return to the defensive. Probably much of it will be retained in home waters to shield the motherland against the Allied assault which already is boiling up.
