DDT OFFERS HOPE FOR EARLY REDUCTION OF HOUSE-FLY TROUBLES

There is an old song which has these words, "Shoo fly! Don't bother me!"

Yet a person might sing that song all day without being able to keep flies away from him. Screens help to keep flies outdoors, but they are likely to get in when doors are opened for someone to leave or enter the house.

During the past century, a "war on the fly" has been fought. People have used sticky paper, fly swatters and poison sprays against the insects. They also have taken more care about keeping garbage in tightly closed cans.

All of those things do some good, but they are not enough. Houseflies still bother people, and experts say that they sometimes spread disease germs. When the present war is over, there will be a new and important help in stamping out houseflies. This will come from the use of DDT. The chemical known as DDT was given the short name to save people from having to use a very long name. That long name, if you want it, is "dichloro-diphenyl-riochlorethane."

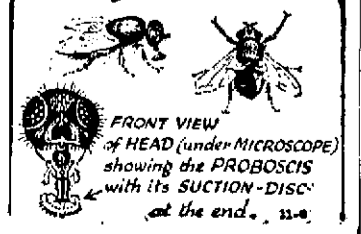

Committeemen other than Vivian are Lieut. Col. H. L. Garner and Benjamin J. Bull.



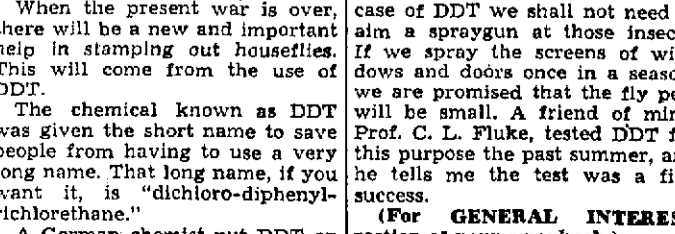
