destroys insects which spread certain diseases, also insects which are pests inside houses. Now the question comes, "Can DDT rid the world of pests which destroy crops?"

eating a dozen apples, each with a tiny bit of DDT, might suffer as a result.

Another trouble with EDT is the danger to bees and other insects of value to mankind. These insects spread pollen and help plants to make seeds which will grow the next season.

Scientists are trying to produce other insect-killers. One such scientist is Dr. Thomas C. Allen of the University of Wisconsin. For six years he has been working to make a good insect spray from the sabadilla plant, and at last has met success,

The sabadilla plant has the nickname of "Indian barley," and belongs to the lily family. Its stalks reach a height of from two to five feet.

Dr. Allen told me the other day about the hundreds of tests he has made with sabadilla. He learned that only the seeds can supply poison, and they are of value only after certain treatment. The froghopper is one of the ground to powder and heated with kerosene, sabadilla becomes a poison of high value in destroying leafhoppers, squash hugs, cabbage worms and grasshoppers.








