Almost Excellent Book

Tells a Great Leaend "The Roots of the Tree," by Helen Todd, Haughton Miffilm. 258 pages, \$2.50. Reviewed by Jim Larsen

In telling of what will be-come one of the great legends of the current war, Helen Todd has just missed writing an excellent book. The same story by another author will hit the mark of Hemingway in his tales of another generation at war.

The story has become, like one of the books written by Todd's chief character, Reinhard Eysen, a little "cold," little too diagramatic, w i t h



people not quite human. Eysen, a "non-political" scholar and writer left Germany, with which he had deep spiritual affinities, to accept a chair at a midwestern university in order to work and think as he wanted. From there, excepting for a
