A railroad locomotive is said to have some 250,000 parts. In spite of all these 250,000 parts, a modern locomotive can run at a speed of more than 100 miles per hour and then the only noise one hears is the rumble on the rails. The reason for this is that every individual part of the locomotive is in its proper place and performs the function without interfering with any other of the 249,999 parts whatsoever. The minute that any one of these 250,000 parts gets one-thousandths of an inch out of the place designated for it, friction begins. But so long as every part remains in its place and performs its own functions you have the highest type of cooperation in speed, power and accomplishment.

Similarly, the human body is composed of myriad cells; but most of these cells perform specific functions. Here again the organization of the body is so complete and effective that every specialized function is carried out without the interference of any other specialized cells. The eye does not attempt to tell the ear how to hear; neither does the nose try to tell the tongue how to taste.
