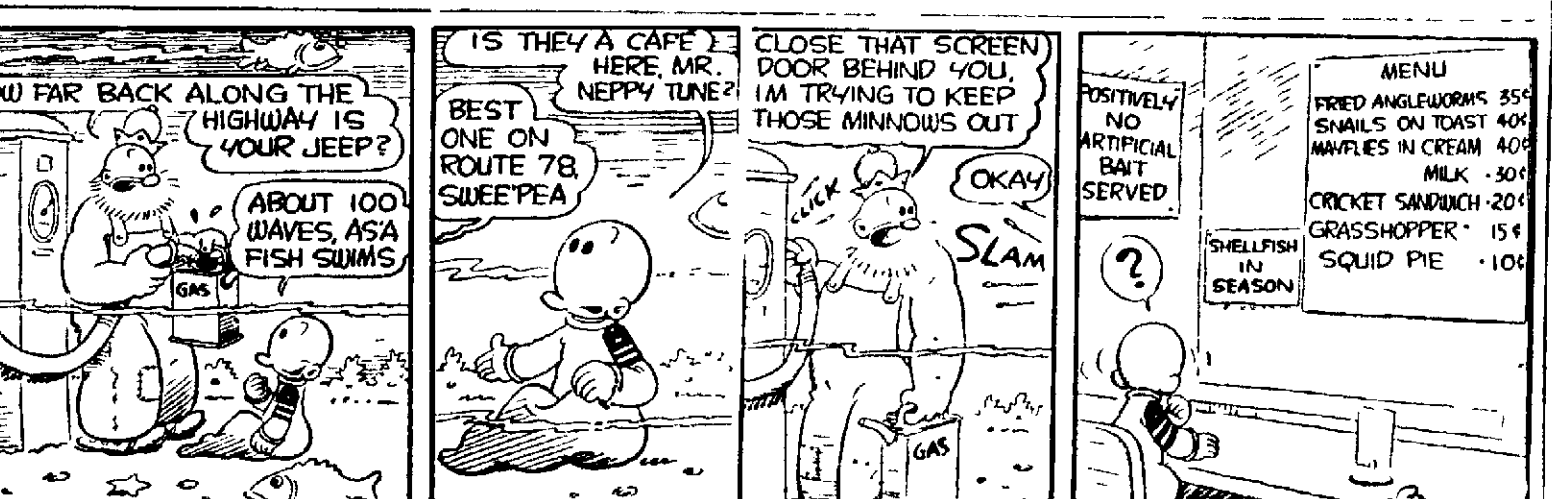
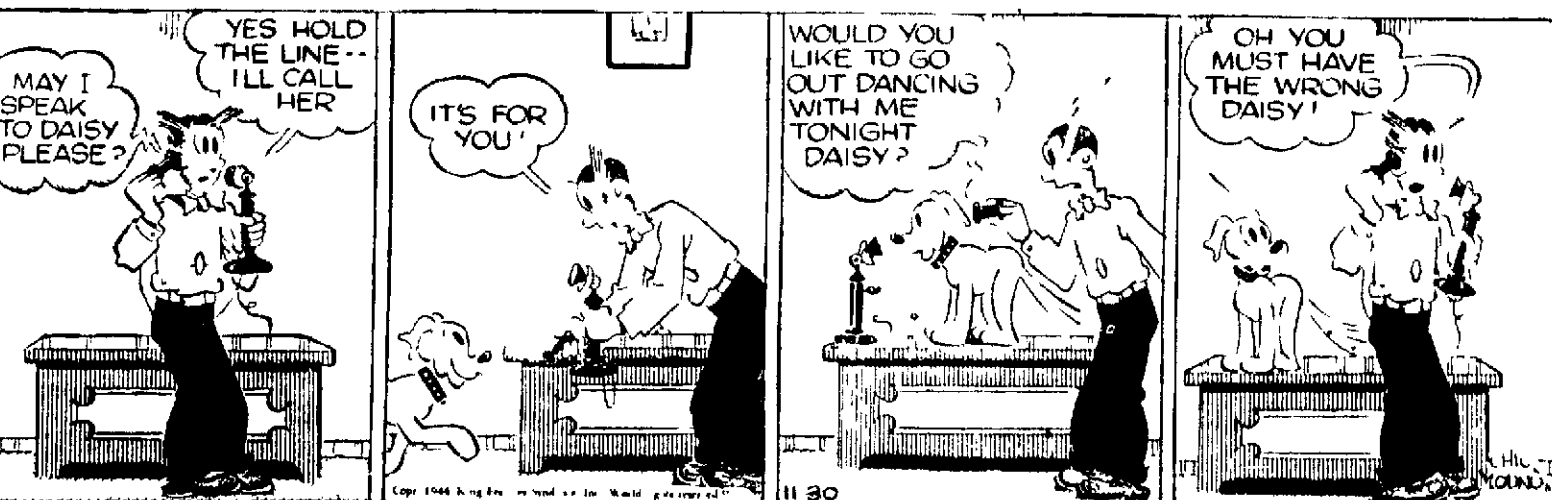

ADDITIONS PLANNED AT VETERANS' HOME

COLUMBUS, O., Nov. 30—(AP)—A \$2,140,200 project to enlarge and improve the Ohio Soldiers and Sailors Home at Sandusky has been recommended to the State Post-War Program Commission. The project would provide facilities for possibly 8,000 World War II veterans, Lt.-Gov. Paul M. Herbert reported.

Herbert, commission chairman, said a subcommittee made a survey of the home and recommended a four-year expansion program. The home now has 300 residents.

COURT REFUSES TO HEAR APPEAL IN DAMAGE SUIT

COLUMBUS, Nov. 30—(UP)—The state supreme court today had refused to hear an appeal from a Butler-co appeals court decision ordering the Johnson Motor Co., of Middletown, to pay \$1,280 in damages to R. C. Leslie, of McSweeney Products.

Leslie, a sign builder, had agreed to build, deliver and erect signs for the Johnson company. After erection the company refused to pay for the signs, charging that they were not constructed as agreed upon, were not delivered on time and never were accepted by the company.

The common pleas court awarded a judgment for Leslie, holding that there was no evidence to support the company's claim that the signs were not manufactured correctly and that the company gave Leslie no notice that it was rejecting the goods. The court of appeals adopted the findings.
