## Lausche Victor In 17 Counties

COLUMBUS, Dec. 1—(UP)—Governor-elect Frank J. Lausche carried only 17 of Ohio's 88 counties in the Nov. 7 election despite the fact that he received one of the largest pluralities given a state candidate, Secretary of State Edward J. Hummel reported today.

An official county-by-county tabulation released by Hummel also disclosed that President Roosevelt carried only 14 counties in losing the state to Gov. Thomas E. Dewey in the 1940 election, the President carried 28 counties. Lausche, however, carried six of the state's eight largest counties by substantial majorities, while his Republican opponent, Mayor James G. Stewart of Cincinnati, carried Hamilton by 46,331 votes and Franklin by 3,743.

The governor-elect carried Cuyahoga-co by 192,156 votes, Lucas by 11,407 votes, Mahoning by 33,823 votes, Montgomery by 17,165 votes, Summit by 41,184 votes, and Stark by 8,842 votes.

Little Morgan-co in Southeastern Ohio was the state's most predominantly Republican county, casting 4,247 Republican and only 1,965 Democratic ballots out of a total vote of 5,907 in the gubernatorial contest.

In addition to the six larger counties which he carried, Lausche also won Belmont, Butler, Clark, Jefferson, Lorain, Pike, Portage, Trumbull, Tuscarawas, Ottawa and Portage-co's.

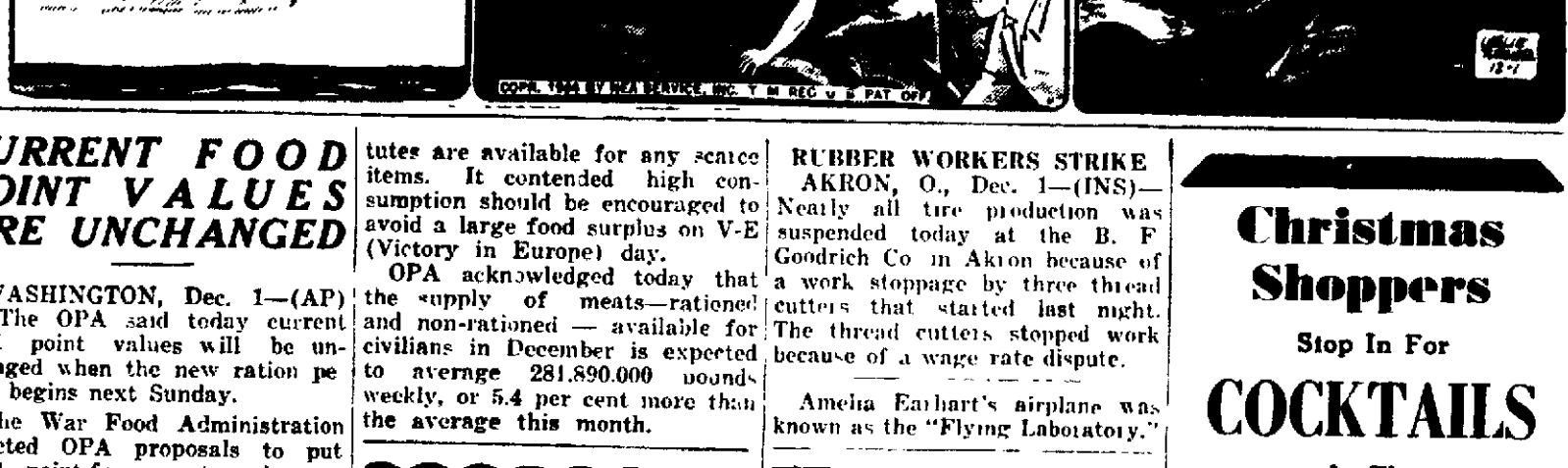

# Law To Cause Delay In New Year Revelry

COLUMBUS, O., Dec. 1—(INS)—New Year's will be a little late this year.

That is, the celebration with the "spirits that cheer" will be delayed till the first second after midnight on both Christmas and New Year's eve because Ohio law forbids the sale of alcoholic beverages on Sundays.

When Christmas and New Year's fall on Monday, the problem of what to do on the holiday even until the clock strikes midnight confronts the bartenders' customers.

State Liquor Director Don Fisher pointed a "spit-ted" picture for both holiday celebrations.

Said he: "Liquor stocks for Christmas and New Year's will be considerably easier than they have been."

"But," he added, to quell undue optimism, "Scotch and bonded whiskeys still are limited. The best you'll be able to get within the next ration periods will be the blended whiskeys, brandies, and rum."

Fisher hesitated to set the date for the next ration period after the current one ends Dec. 9, without knowing the figures on sales at the state's liquor stores for this week.

Ohio cities also have ordinances putting the damper on "spirited" frolics on Sunday. In the capital city the ordinance says no alcoholic beverage shall be sold until 5 a. m. Monday.

In the hope of allowing the bells of happy New Year to bring out the bottles the city fathers are expected to consider a resolution permitting liquor to be sold from 12:10 a. m. to 2:30 a. m. Monday, Jan. 1.

Precedent for the proposed action in Columbus is the fact that the same problem arose in 1939, when the city council relaxed the post-midnight regulations enough to permit the traditional celebrations.

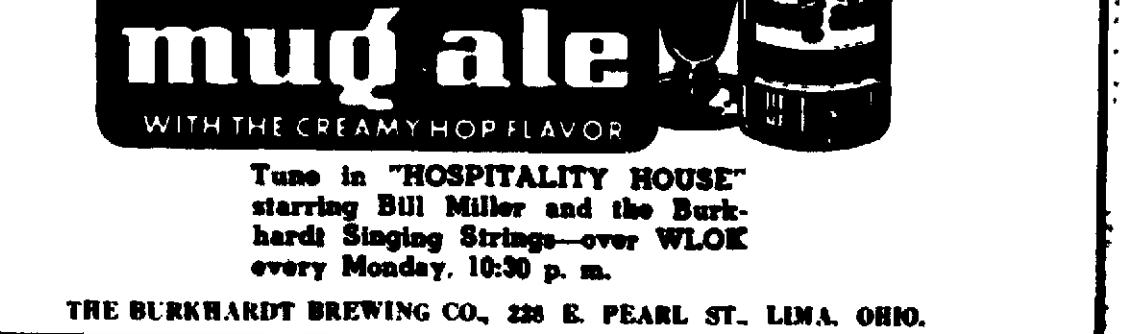
