H., after the front trucks of a baggage car became derailed.

Many of the men played the concert with fuzzy chins from their luggage, containing full evening dress and shaving equipment, did not arrive at the concert hall until a few minutes before playing time.

### ANTI-SNIPING ORDER NEVER PUT IN EFFECT

SUPREME HEADQUARTERS ALLIED EXPEDITIONARY FORCE, Paris, Dec. 2 — (AP)—Maj.-Gen. Jacques Leclerc's anti-sniping proclamation threatening to execute five German hostages for every French soldier shot in Strasbourg never was carried out, supreme headquarters announced officially today.

Despite protests from the German radio which chose to place its own interpretation on the proclamation, the issue was regarded here as closed.

Leclerc and his French armored division have since moved to further field operations, and Strasbourg is under the normal combination of military district and French civil administration control.

Memorial services for Jack V. Blunden Mo. M. M. 1-c, 23, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Blunden of Lafayette, who was killed in action early in November in the Southwest Pacific, will be held at 3 p. m. Sunday in the Congregational Christian church.

Seaman Blunden enlisted Jan. 1, 1942, less than one month after Pearl Harbor, receiving basic training at Great Lakes, Ill., and the U. S. Naval Receiving Station, San Diego, Cal. He went overseas Nov. 11, 1942, and served in New Guinea, Australia, and the Southwest Pacific, having completed two years active duty.

In addition to his parents, survivors include two brothers, Larry, at home, and Justin Blunden S 2-c, Great Lakes, Ill.
