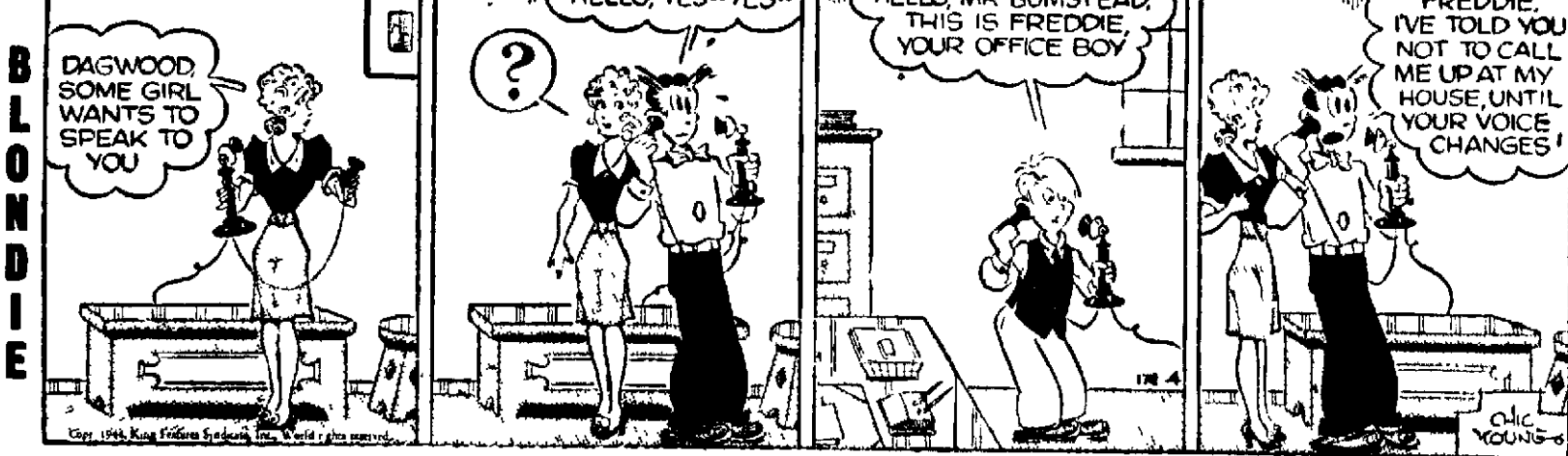

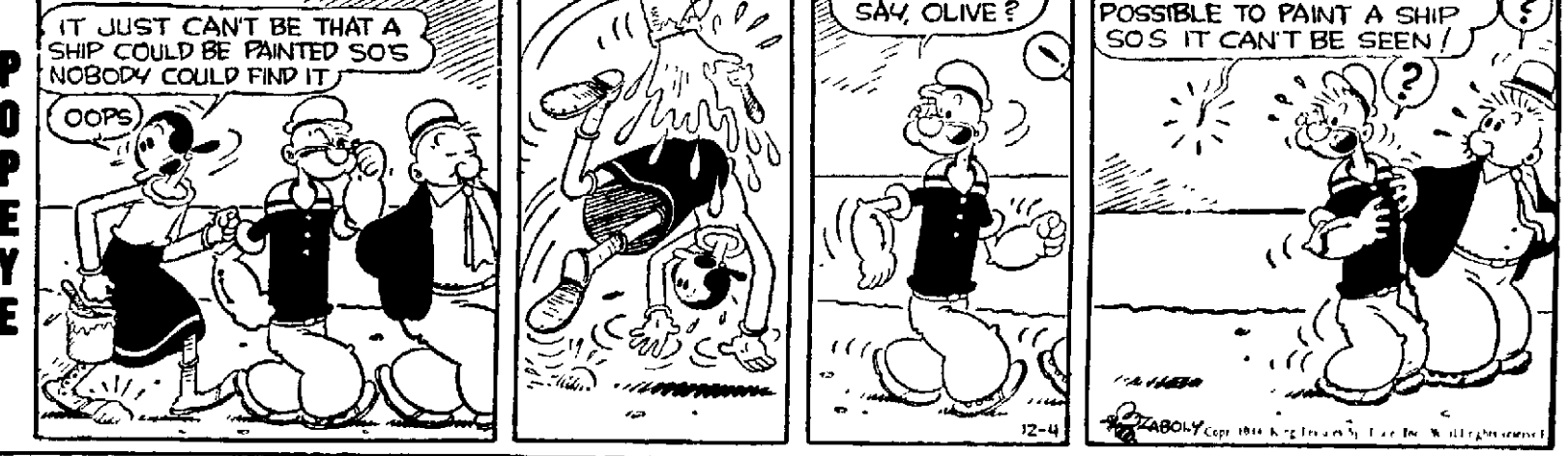

OPA REGULATION OF COMMERCIAL RENTS STUDIED

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4 (INSY)—Sen. Robert A. Taft (R) Ohio, predicted today congress will postpone any action on commercial rental regulation until the present price control act renewal is considered next April.

Meanwhile, landlords and their representative prepared to tell their side of the rental situation today to a senate committee studying the bill of Sen. Robert F. Wagner (D) N. Y., to bring commercial property under Office of Price Administration rent control.

Taft, a member of the senate banking committee which heard testimony of exorbitant rental boosts, declared "the situation shown is serious, but it seems confined to the loft area in New York and is primarily the obligation of the New York State legislature."

"I think the committee will hesitate to recommend new controls at this late stage in the war effort," he said.

Taft and other committee members indicated in clashes with witnesses that they consider the situation a matter for congressional action only if it has a nationwide inflationary effect.

"It is a matter of getting justice for the tenant firms, and that is a matter for the state legislature to handle," Taft said.

But if the legislature, which meets in January, does not act and business places are still affected, congress might extend the rent control act to protect them, Taft believes.
