Scientists Study Ability Of Man To Scan Future

LONDON, Dec. 7.—(UP)—Basil Shackleton, well-known London photographer who has predicted among other things that the war in Europe will end Aug. 17, 1945, took as a matter of course today the report by two scientists concerning his ability to look into the future—in other words, to describe an event before it happens.

While research workers and psychological authorities were hailing as epochal the publication of a report on his remarkable talents, the tall, ascetic man told The United Press that there was an occasional drawback to having a unique mind.

"Sometimes," he said, "I sit in a bar having a drink and for no apparent reason a complete stranger will grab me by the neck and punch me in the jaw."

Shackleton said he believes his assailants—and they have assailed him several times—were people whose weaker minds were disturbed by his powerful, probing one. These people, he reasoned, were conscious only that somehow aggravating thought waves emanated from him and that these persons were taking direct, intellectual action in return.

Shackleton's faculty, known as precognitive telepathy, has been charted by Dr. S. G. Soal of Queen Mary college in association with K. H. Goldney over a period of three years. Tests, all rigidly supervised and often made before eminent scientists, have mainly concerned his efforts to read cards selected by a researcher in another room.

Dr. Soal originally had looked for evidence of straight mental telepathy, but Shackleton never seemed to guess the card as it was picked in the other room. Only later, while checking his records, did Dr. Soal discover his subject had correctly named cards two and three ahead of those picked.

Shackleton had done this so frequently, it was found, there was almost no mathematical possibility of it being accidental (the chances against accident were listed one to a figure having 37 ciphers.)

In a formal report Dr. Soal said undoubtedly Shackleton was reading "the future state of mind of a person who gazed at card symbols. That is, he was foreseeing what could be in the agent's mind two and one-half seconds later.

"It was truly displacement into future time... the mental event still in the future was apparently affecting the present mental event and the seemingly normal law of causation was being reversed."
