**Uncle Ray's Corner**  
Hungary Became Leading Nation During Reign of Matthias  
Yesterday I spoke about Hunyadi, a military hero of Hungary who lived 600 years ago. He held the office of regent for a time, but did not become king. It was left for one Hunyadi's Bohemia, as well as of Hungary. His empire included the city of Vienna. Matthias helped to promote arts and science in Hungary, and brought about better laws. When he died, people said, "Matthias is dead—there is no more justice." Hungary suffered in several ways after the death of Matthias. He left behind him no son who could take the throne, and several persons struggled for the royal palace. It was years before Ferdinand, a Hapsburg prince, won clear power over Hungary. This prince also was king of Austria. The Hapsburg kings became powerful in Europe, and for a time held control of Holland and Alsace, as well as over Austria and Hungary. When the first World War broke out, the Austro-Hungarian empire was large and important. It was ruled by Francis Joseph, who was known as "emperor of Austria and king of Hungary." This ruler died during the war. After the close of the war, the empire was broken up. Hungary became an inland country with an area of less than 36,000 square miles. The capital of Hungary is Budapest, a city which had a population of 1,585,000 in 1940. There was a time when the Danube river. One of these was known as Buda, and the other as Pest. In 1872 these two cities joined together and became Budapest. (For HISTORY section of your scrapbook.)
