

A natural question is this, "How

can the earth be making a speed of 18 miles a second, in its trip around the sun, when we do not notice any such motion?"

Astronomers have figured the earth's speed with great care. You can do this yourself, if you like.
The average distance of the earth from the sun is 93,000,000 miles. The earth travels six and two-seventh times that distance in a year. After you get that figure, all you need to do is to divide it

by the number of seconds in a

year.

We do not notice the earth's motion around the sun, because the earth does not "pass by" any objects which are close to its surface. The moon, 239,000 miles away, travels around the sun in
