RETIREMENT OF BRIDGE BONDS TO BE PROPOSED

COLUMBUS, Jan. 26—(UP)—State Sen. Joseph T. Williamson, D., of East Liverpool, today disclosed that he will introduce a bill to retire all outstanding bonds on Ohio's four toll bridges and make them toll-free.

Williamson said the bill will be in line with the recommendations made by Democratic State Auditor Joseph T. Ferguson in his annual departmental report.

The auditor had estimated that the cost of the bridges to users would be \$5,611,120 if the outstanding bonds were permitted to run to maturity date. The bridges are located at Sandusky Bay, Fort Steuben, Pomeroy and East Liverpool.

Ferguson said the amount of bonds outstanding as of Dec. 31 and the number of years of operation required to retire the bonds were: Sandusky Bay, \$656,000, four years; Fort Steuben, \$755,000, five years; Pomeroy, \$199,000, six years, and East Liverpool, \$1,575,000, 13 years.

The total bonded indebtedness was reduced to approximately \$3,000,000 last year.

O'BOYLE MUST FACE BANK THEFT CHARGE

O'Boyle also is wanted in Youngstown, O., in connection with the slaying of Happy Mariano in 1937, FBI Agent Spencer Drayton said.

PROGRESS SEEN UNDER SYSTEM OF FREE TRADE

CINCINNATI, Jan. 26—(AP)—Great progress in America in the half century under a system of free competition was predicted by spokesmen of the National Association of Manufacturers in closing their two-day golden anniversary meeting last night.

Frederick C. Crawford, Cleveland, O., chairman of the NAM's executive committee, speaking against what he termed "planned security," asserted, "there is more security for working men in industries and businesses not yet born than in all the planning of the whole government."

Dr. Howard L. Bevis, president of Ohio State university, said the "government movement to regiment research is the most serious long-term threat to our material prosperity."

He added "a candid proposal to congress now seeks a single head, operating control of all research, research personnel, research equipment with power to formulate and reject projects."

SUPERINTENDENT OF WHITE CROSS HOSPITAL DIES

COLUMBUS, O., Jan. 26—(AP)—Dr. Frank G. Fowler, 67, superintendent of White Cross hospital, died last night.

A Methodist minister, Dr. Fowler entered the hospital Wednesday night. The hospital, which he directed since 1931, is operated by the Ohio conference of the Methodist church.

Death was due to a heart ailment.

He was pastor of seven Ohio Methodist churches before assuming the hospital post: at Seneca, Cortland, Millersburg, Cuyahoga Falls, Ashtabula, East Liverpool and Bexley.

A native of Harrison-co, he received a bachelor of science degree from Old Scio, O., college in 1906; bachelor of divinity from Mt. Union college in 1909, and doctor of divinity from Drew Theological seminary in 1921.

He was a past president of the Ohio Hospital-assn.

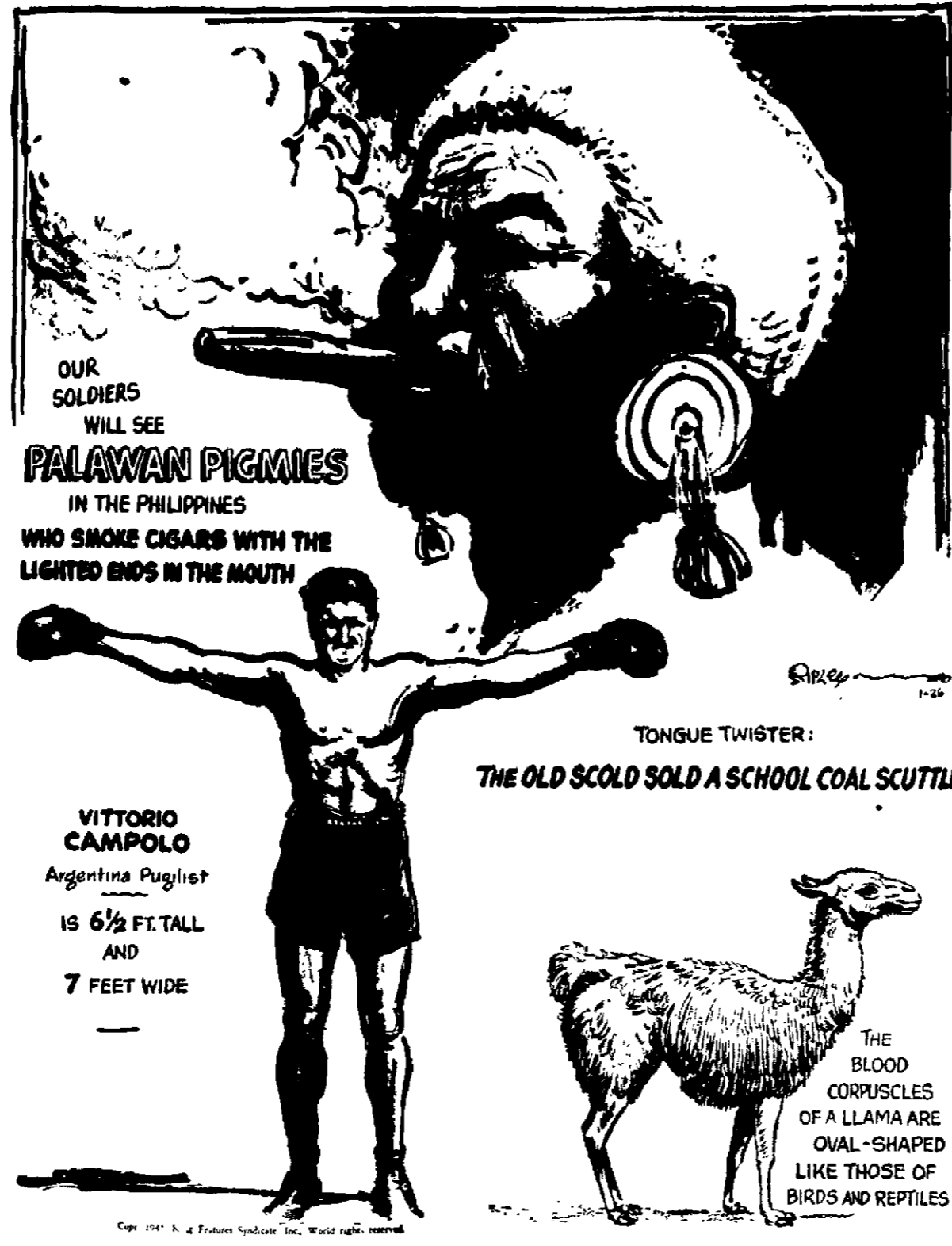

SHEEP, LAMB POPULATION OF OHIO DECLINES

COLUMBUS, Jan. 26—(UP)—The estimated number of sheep and lambs on feed for market on Ohio farms as of Jan. 1 was substantially lower than a year ago, the Ohio Crop Reporting Service said today, despite a four per cent increase for the 11-state cornbelt area.

Ohio had only 281,000 head of sheep and lambs on feed this year as compared with 375,000 in Jan., 1944, the service said. The number of sheep and lambs on feed in the 11-state area was 4,108,000 as compared with 3,967,000 in Jan., 1944.

Five other cornbelt states—Indiana, Minnesota, Iowa, Missouri and Nebraska—showed decreases while three others—Illinois, Michigan and South Dakota—were unchanged. Wisconsin recorded a sharp increase, the service said.

Ohio also recorded a decrease in the number of cattle on feed for market. The number of cattle on feed in the state at the beginning of this year was 86,000 head as compared with 102,000 in Jan., 1944, and a high of 135,000 set in 1943.

The 12 principal cattle producing states in the cornbelt area, however, recorded a six per cent increase. The entire group had 3,373,000 head of cattle on feed. Indiana was the only other state in the group to show a decrease.

SENATE GROUP TO PROBE PLANE RIDES FOR DOGS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26—(AP)—The senate military committee today voted to investigate the priority system which gave a dog owned by Col. Elliott Roosevelt precedence over three servicemen.

The three, flying west on leave, were forced off an Army cargo plane at Memphis, Tenn., early last month while the English bull mastiff, traveling under an "A" priority, was permitted to continue the flight.

The investigation was suggested by Senator Bridges (R-NH), who told reporters his motion carried without a dissent.

SOVIET ENVOY DIES IN PLANE

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 26—(AP)—Soviet Ambassador Constantine Oumansky, his wife and seven of eight other persons were killed today in the crash of a Mexican air force plane near here.

The ambassador, Mrs. Oumansky and the others were leaving for Costa Rica, to which country Oumansky is accredited as minister. He was to present his credentials there.

The plane, carrying the embassy party of nine and two pilots, took off from the Mexico City airport and crashed within 500 yards of the runway as it was trying to gain altitude.

Before coming to Mexico, Oumansky was Soviet ambassador to the United States.
