Uncle Ray's Corner Baldwin Built Small Locomotive for Use by Philadelphia Museum 111

In 1830, Philadelphia had a 35yenr-old citizen named Matthias Baldwin. It can hardly be said that he was famous at that time. but he had won some note. He had built a steam engine to turn cylinders which printed calico

in Great Britain. One day he
asked Baldwin to build a model of
a locomotive for the museum.
Baldwin soon turned out a



1-19---4 Philadelphia artist made this picture of an engine and car about 1831. The locomotive shown was the "Rocket," a British production which, in a general way, served as a model for the first locomotives built by Matthias Baldwin.

The Baldwin locomotive was given the name of "Old Ironsides." Here, in short form, is an account by one of Baldwin's helpers of a test run which it made:
