



Uncle Ray's Corner PASSENGERS ENJOYED LITTLE SERVICE ON EARLY

SLEEPING CARS In the year 1858 a rather odd cartoon appeared in "Harper's Weekly," a magazine printed in New York. The cartoon had the title of "General View of a Night Car on the Central."

The "general view" which the artist showed was made up chiefly of the legs of men who were riding on a train at night. The legs were resting chiefly, on the backs of the seats ahead of the passen-

gers.
That was an amusing picture, and it had some truth in it. The seats in many railway cars of that time were closer together than those of the present. There was a great problem to find what to do great problem to find what to do with your legs when you wanted to sleep, especially when there were two passengers for each double seat. Even today there is much the same trouble when a person rides at night on day coaches of an older type. We do not, however, have the custom of draping our legs on the back of the seat aheadt Sleeping cars were far from he-


Sleeping cars were far from being common in 1858, but they did exist. Twenty-two years before, a company in Pennsylvania had started a sleeping-car service. This was the Cumberland Valley railroad, and people who traveled from Harrisburg to another Penn-

along. Railway tracks were far from being "even," and many pas-sengers could not get to sleep.

Several other railway lines adopted sleeping curs of the same sind. Each one had several For a time there were no bed clothes. It was supposed that if a passenger had a mattress to lie on, that was enough. He could cover

himself with a coat, or with a blanket of his own, if he had brought one along.

People complained about the company not supplying bed cloth-ing, and at length a closet was put in at one end of each car. The passenger could go there and take out the sheets and blankets which looked cleanest to him. Of course there were times when these jects were washed, but-sad to say


