PILOT "RIDES OUT" DOOMED PLANE SAFELY

COLUMBUS, O., Feb. 6.—(INS)—Columbus residents knew today the full significance of "so much owed to a few" as a 24-year-old Navy test pilot "rode out" his doomed plane rather than crash in the residential section of the city.

Shortly after Lt. Herman K. Kopp of Alexandria, Va., attached to the Naval air facility at Port Columbus, took off from Port Columbus, his single-seat fighter plane engine began to miss.

When Lt. Kopp prepared to bail out, the motor had stopped and his parachute opened 100 feet off the ground.

Altho the plane was wrecked completely, the pilot suffered only a bruised leg.

With losing speed and his plane in a stall, the Navy lieutenant notified the control tower he was "riding his ailing plane down."

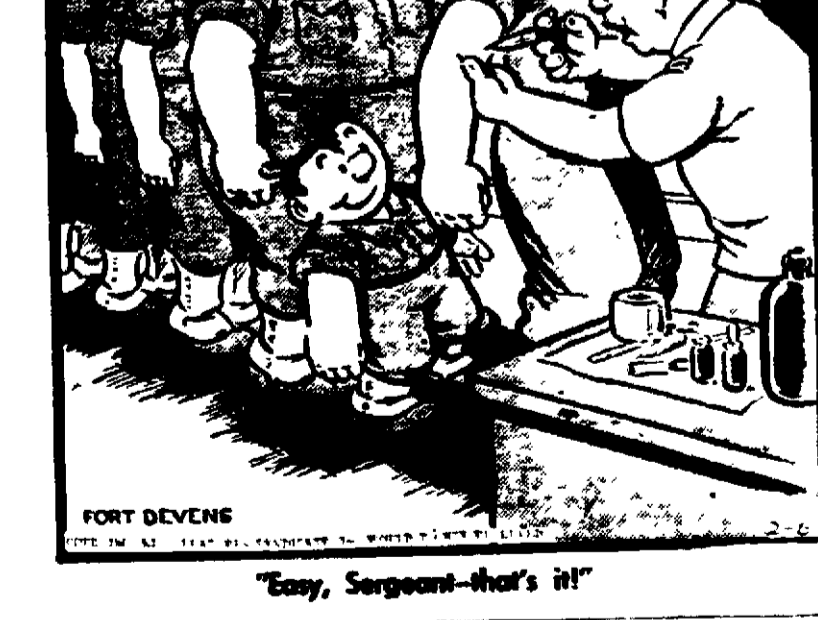
For several nerve-wracking minutes the disabled plane flew at 200 feet, lower than the capital city's tallest downtown building, until it had cleared the populated area.

Winters Were Colder Then— But, Local Residents Are Willing To Bet Hard Cash That They Weren't Any Longer!

"This is the coldest winter we've ever had." "It is not, why I recollect back in '05—"

Thus starts a conversation that sometimes sends blood rushing thru arteries at high speed as the "I recollect" group vehemently insists that this or that winter was much colder than the present one.

Files of The Lima News cannot substantiate any claims as to whether or not 1945 is the coldest winter because of differences in the interpretation of what constitute a cold winter.

In long-sustained periods of sub-freezing temperatures few doubt that the present winter either holds the record or is very near it. But newspaper files do record many winters that had colder days.

When the temperatures in Lima dipped to 20 below zero on Jan. 23, 1936, the records of Elmer McClain, amateur meteorologist, were published, reporting the "lows" in temperatures over the years following 1900.

Incidentally, the day on which temperatures reached the 20 below mark, was followed by a second day at which 16 below was reported. The current winter has not yet seen a day to compare to either of these, with four below holding the record thus far.

Other memorable winter days in which Lima "shivered in its boots," revealed in the records compiled by McClain include Jan. 4, 1904 and Jan. 12, 1918, when 17 below zero was recorded; Jan. 14, 1905 and Feb. 14, 1906 when the mercury reached 16 below; and Feb. 20, 1934, Dec. 17, 1929 and Dec. 15, 1917 when 15 below was recorded.

By contrast several winters were experienced in which there were no sub-zero days, such as in 1921 and 1931 when the lowest reported temperatures were 12 above zero.

The longest extended period of this milder weather reached from 1926 to 1930, with Lima enjoying brief visions of the end of the glacial age, as three above zero was the record low. However, this dream was shattered with a blast of frigidly on Dec. 17, 1930 that drove the temperatures to 15 below.

The temperatures were recorded include 1914, 1915, 1921, 1926 to 1929, inclusive, and 1931.

BUC FORMS FOR '45 REPORTS TO BE SIMPLIFIED

COLUMBUS, O., Feb. 6.—(INS)—Ohio employers during 1945 will have a new and simplified report form to file with the Bureau of Unemployment Compensation, it was announced today.

BUC Administrator Charles H. Jones said the major simplification in these forms (UCO-WE), used quarterly by Ohio employers to report wages and contributions to the bureau, will be the elimination of the requirement that employers list their payrolls by months. Quarterly payroll figures only are required on the new forms.

Copies of the new forms will be mailed to all covered employers the latter part of March in time for them to be completed and returned to the bureau during April, which is the report month for the first quarter of 1945.

Nearly 37,700 Ohio employers in 1945 will be eligible for experience rates as compared with 36,778 last year. The additional 1,000 represent those who by having complete three and a half consecutive years of business operation under the law came within experience rating provisions.

COUPLE CHARGED WITH DESERTING BABY IN AUTO

TOLEDO, O., Feb. 6.—(INS)—Edward Mull, 46, and his wife, Herma, 41, former residents of Wauseon now living in Detroit, were charged today with abandoning their eight-day-old daughter in a parked automobile in Toledo.

The affidavits were sworn to by Sgt. Alfred Bartkowiak of the Lucas-co sheriff's office, who said that the couple had confessed to Detroit authorities that they abandoned the infant. They were turned over to Toledo officials today.

Bartkowiak said that the couple told Detroit authorities that the infant, known as Baby Sue, was born to Mrs. Mull on Jan. 16 in Grace hospital, Detroit, four days after they left Wauseon. The baby, found in the car Jan. 24, was traced thru its footprints.

Dr. H. H. Brueckner, superintendent of the Lima District hospital, will read the pictures and will submit the reports to the individuals.

170 Millions Collected In Ohio '44 Taxes

COLUMBUS, O., Feb. 6.—(INS)—State Tax Commissioner C. Emory Glander today reported a total of \$170,681,167 collected in taxes in Ohio during 1944 while estimating receipts of \$165,050,000 in 1945 and \$169,925,000 in 1946.

Glander said he based his estimates for this year and next on the existing tax structure in Ohio. Responsible for the expected drop of \$5,631,167 in this year's tax collections was a decrease of \$1,877,282 from last year's cigarette tax receipts and of \$1,737,214 from last year's retail sales tax collections.

Glander said the cigarette tax decrease represented the largest percentage decrease for 1945, but estimated a \$250,000 increase in receipts in 1946 because of heavier plantings of tobacco.

The tax commissioner's estimated \$3,000,000 increase in gasoline tax receipts by 1946 was based on the end of the European war and resulting relaxation in gasoline rationing. Glander predicted \$3,750,000 would be collected in 1946 from the two-cent gasoline tax as against the \$30,644,000 levied in 1944. The one-cent liquid fuel tax likewise would show a rise to \$12,375,000 in 1946 over last year's \$11,153,168.

All of the \$170,681,167 collected in 1944 went into the state's general revenue fund with some exceptions. Out of the \$30,644,000 gas tax receipts came \$14,000,000 for administrative purposes, \$10,000,000 for highway improvement, \$6,500,000 for highway maintenance and repair, and \$14,000,000 to local tax districts.

Of the \$13,117,318 received from the public utility excise, \$6,162,503 went for county poor relief.

663 ST. MARYS FACTORY WORKERS' CHESTS X-RAYED

ST. MARYS, Feb. 6.—Six hundred sixty-three employees of Goodyear St. Marys had their chests x-rayed under the program sponsored by the Auglaize-co Tuberculosis and Health association. The x-rays were made without charge to the employees, the association bearing the full expense of the x-rays as a part of its service to the public.
