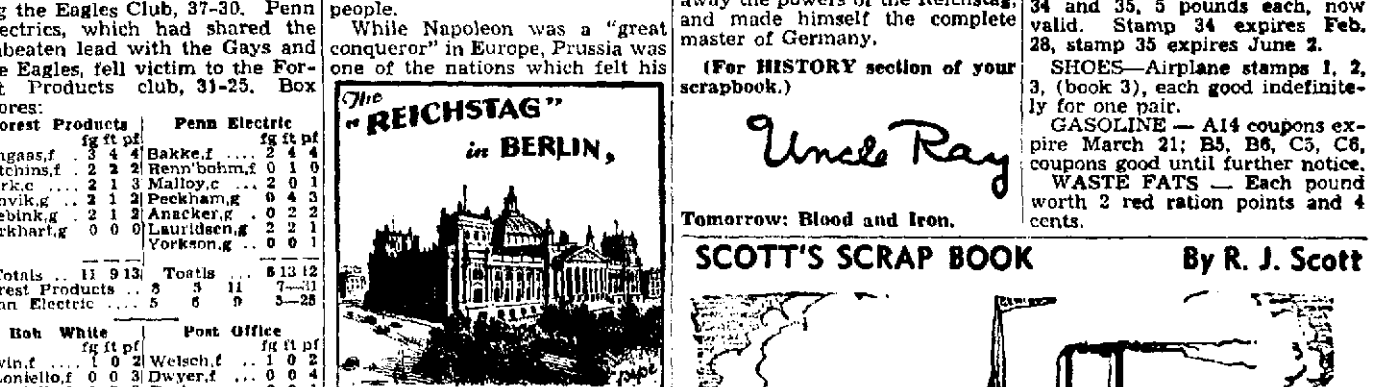
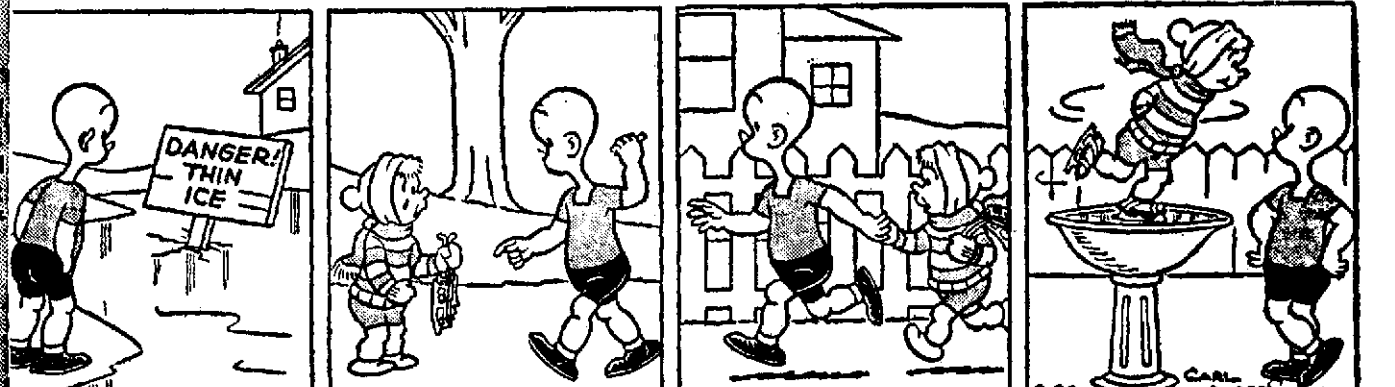
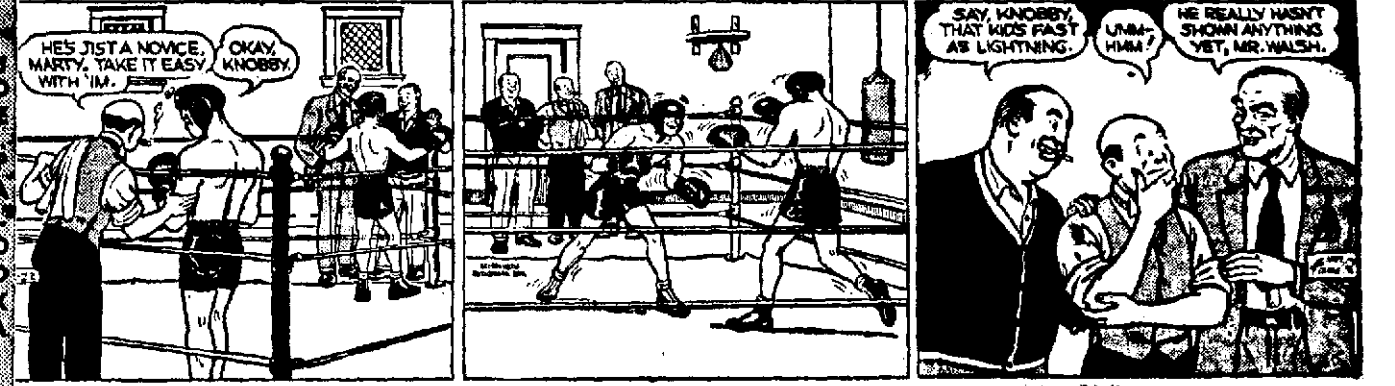

HITLER TOOK COMPLETE POWER AFTER 1933 REICHSSTAG FIRE

During the first 450 years of its life, Berlin grew very slowly, and reached a population of only 10,000.

Then came the time when Frederick I, known as "the first king of Prussia," made it his capital. Frederick added nearby towns to the city, and started the Academy of Science. During his reign, and after it, Berlin grew swiftly. By 1800 it was the home of 172,000 people.

While Napoleon was a "great conqueror" in Europe, Prussia was one of the nations which felt his power.

When Adolf Hitler coaxed the aged President Hindenburg to name him "chancellor," he was not a young man. He was the Reichstag to give him a majority vote.

That trouble was ended before long. The Reichstag building was set on fire, and the fire was blamed on the Communists, who were Hitler's enemies. There is good reason to believe that the fire was started by Nazis, not by Communists.

Shortly after the fire, which happened in 1933, Hitler took away the powers of the Reichstag, and made himself the complete master of Germany.

"FAKED FIRE" FAME.

Later came Napoleon's invasion of Prussia, ending in defeat. After leaving Russia, Napoleon kept some of his power in Prussia and other German states, but he was forced to retreat to the Rhine river in 1813. His final downfall came at the Battle of Waterloo, where the Prussians did a great deal to help the British win the victory.

In the century which followed the Battle of Waterloo, Berlin grew into a huge city, and became the capital of the German empire.

One building in Berlin used to be of great importance. This was the Reichstag, where men chosen by the people used to gather to make laws. After 1919, women, as well as men, were allowed seats
