

Sigma Brings Return Showing Of Victor Herbert Masterpiece

AUTHORIZATION SOUGHT FOR NEW GAS PIPELINE

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27—(AP)—The American Light and Traction Co. has asked the Federal Power Commission for permission to construct a 1,085-mile natural gas pipeline from Guymon, Okla., to points near Detroit and Toledo, O.

The project is intended to supply the Ohio Fuel Gas Co. with 125,000,000 cubic feet of gas daily, and to fill requirements of the Michigan Consolidated Gas Co. above the amount to be furnished by the Panhandle Eastern Pipeline Co. under existing contracts, the application said.

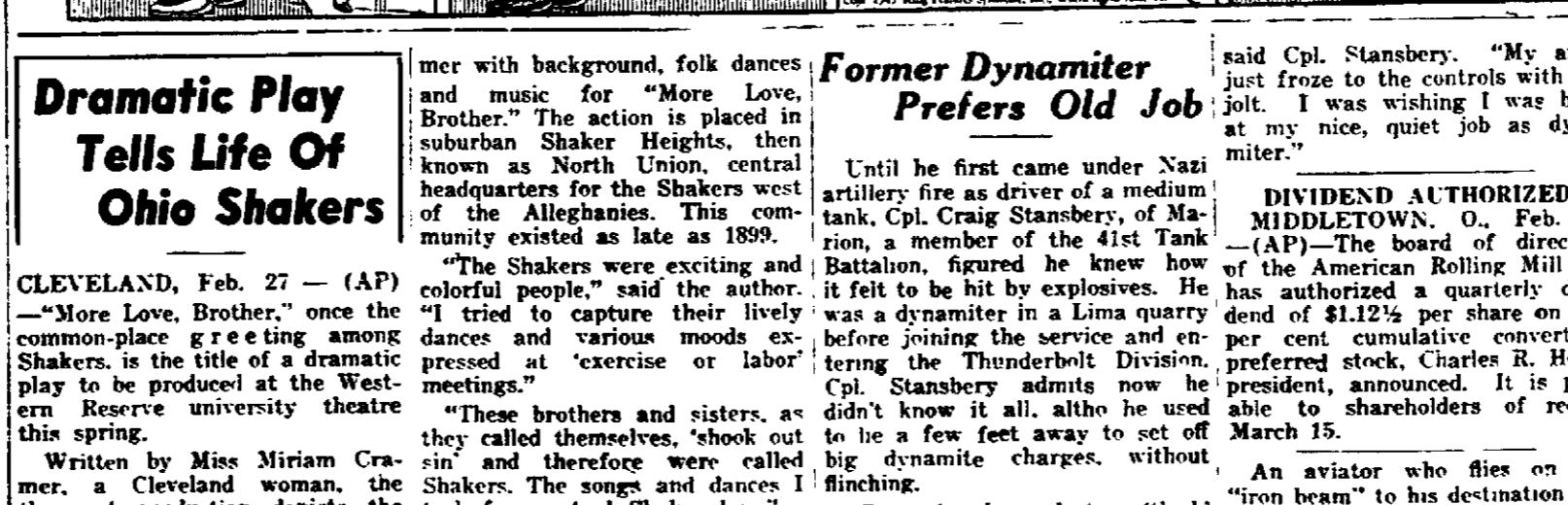
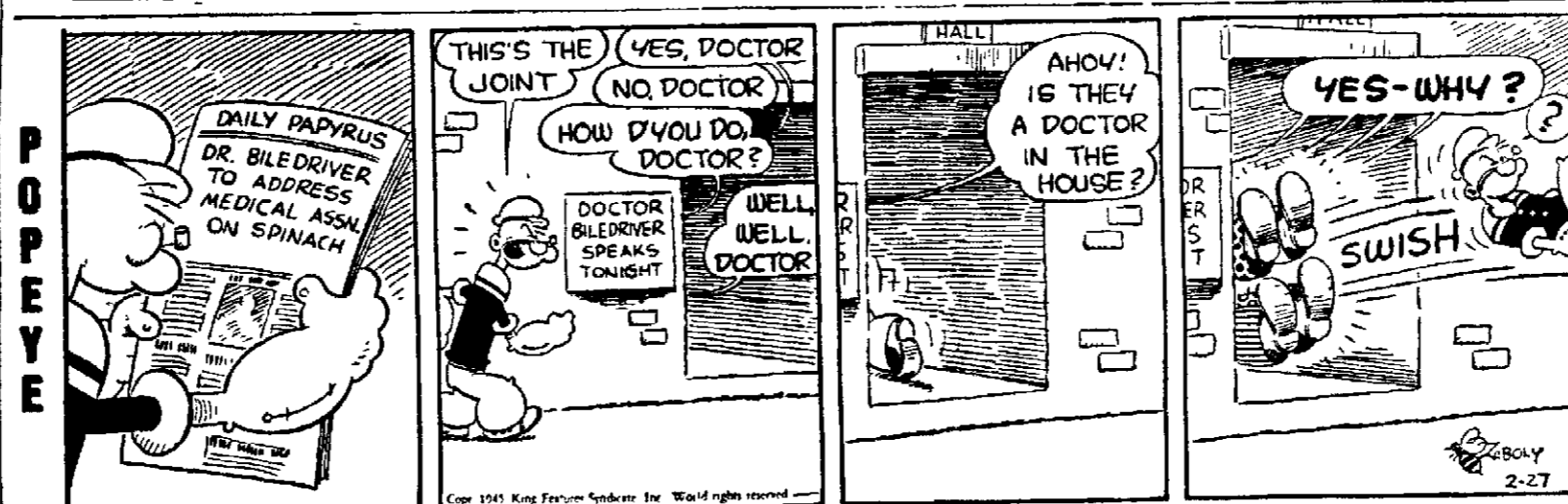
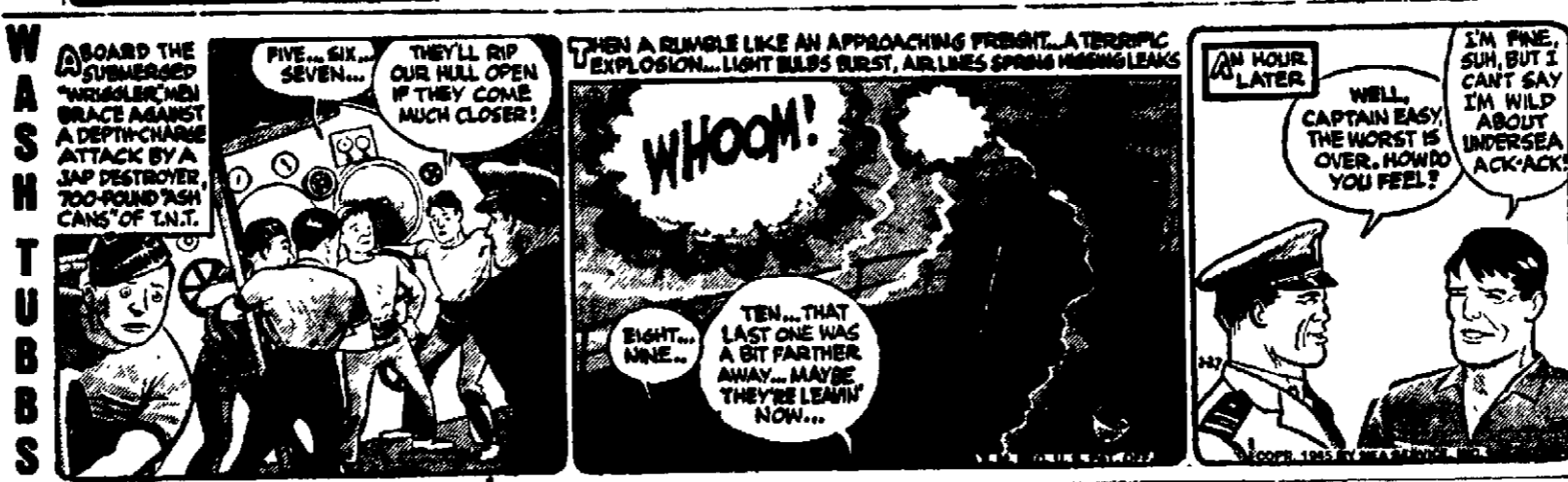

Rev. Huber, who was pastor of one of the Christian churches in Manila, and his wife, previously were interned in Baguio prison camp. According to the government message, they both were reported in fair condition. They have been in the Philippines since 1940.

Dramatic Play Tells Life Of Ohio Shakers

CLEVELAND, Feb. 27—(AP)—"More Love, Brother," once the common-place greeting among Shakers, is the title of a dramatic play to be produced at the Western Reserve university theatre this spring.

Written by Miss Miriam Cramer, a Cleveland woman, the three-act production depicts the life of a community of Shakers in Northern Ohio.

Once among the nation's largest community dwelling religious groups, the Shakers' membership has dwindled from more than 10,000 to approximately 150 persons, said Miss Cramer.

Five years' research among documents of Western Reserve Historical society provided Miss Cramer with background, folk dances and music for "More Love, Brother." The action is placed in suburban Shaker Heights, then known as North Union, central headquarters for the Shakers west of the Alleghenies. This community existed as late as 1839.

"The Shakers were exciting and colorful people," said the author. "I tried to capture their lively dances and various moods expressed at 'exercise or labor' meetings."

"These brothers and sisters, as they called themselves, 'shook out sin' and therefore were called Shakers. The songs and dances I took from actual Shaker lore."
