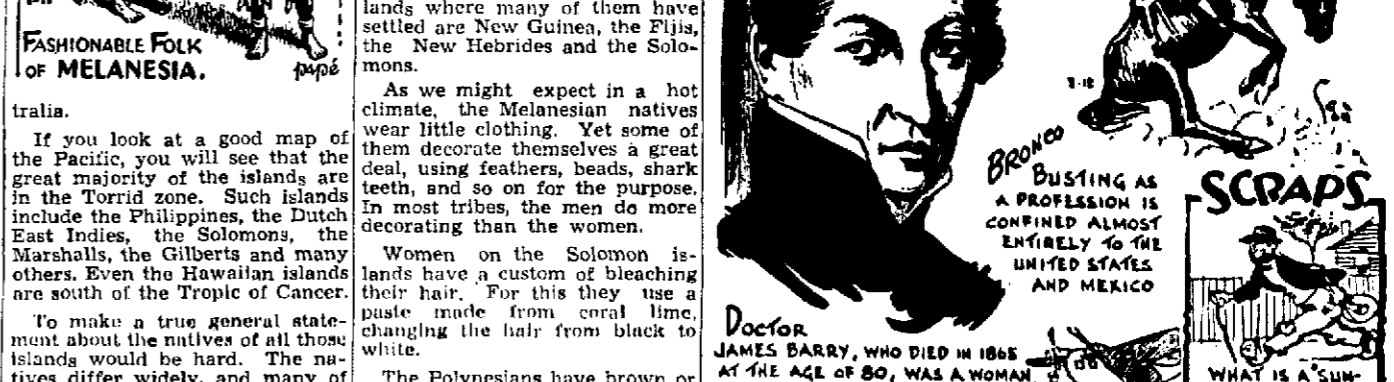
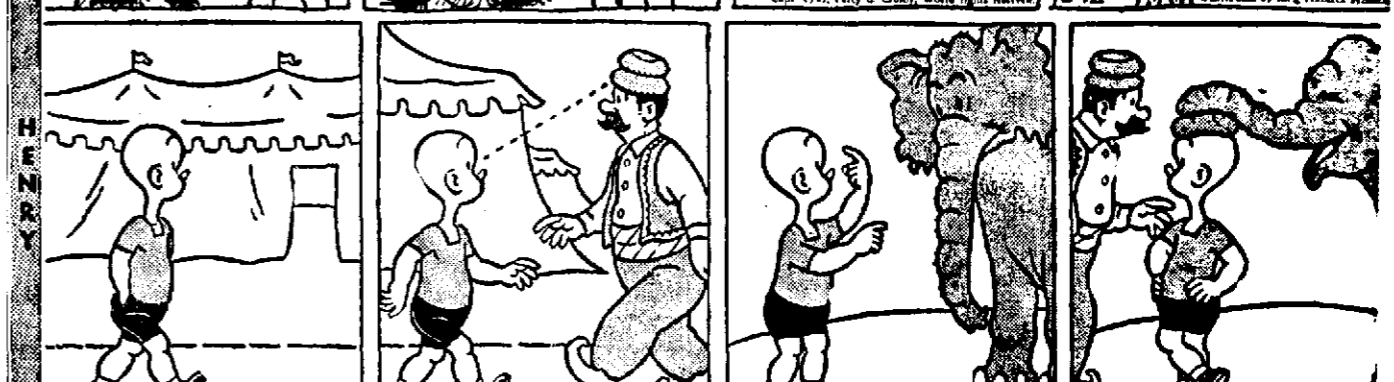
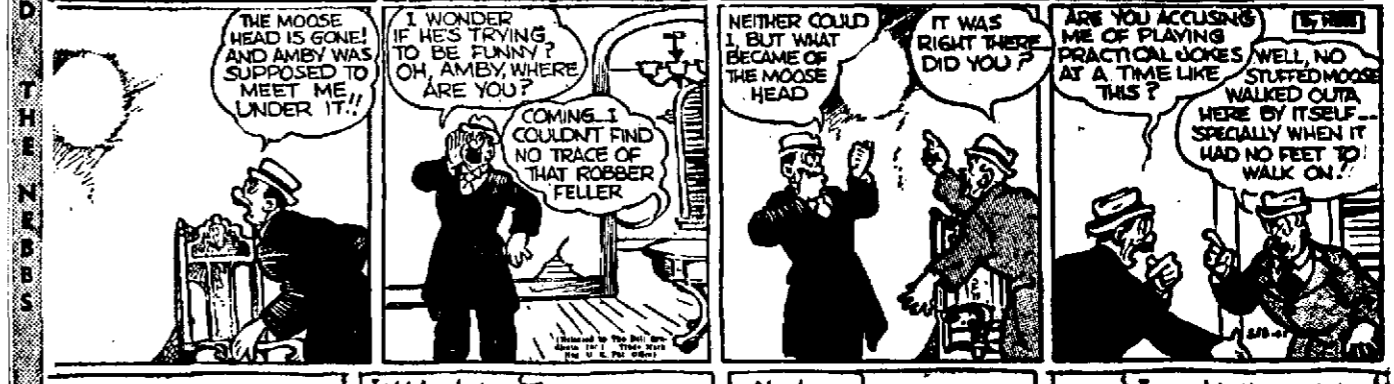

In addition to the people named, these islands have received Portuguese, American, British, German and Russian settlers.
Yet we can say that most islands in the Torrid zone of the Pacific have one, or both, of two main strains of people. These are the Melanesians and the Polynesians.
The word "Melanesian" came from the Greek language, and it means "black islander." The Melanesians have very dark brown, almost black, skins. Among the islands where many of them have settled are New Guinea, the Elpis, the New Hebrides and the Solomons.
As we might expect in a hot climate, the Melanesian natives wear little clothing. Yet some of them decorate themselves a great deal, using feathers, beads, shark teeth, and so on for the purpose. In most tribes, the men do more decorating than the women.
Women on the Solomon islands have a custom of bleaching their hair. For this they use a paste made from coral lime, changing the hair from black to white.
The Polynesians have brown or olive skins, often very light, and they seem much "better looking" to white visitors than the dark Melanesians. Samoa, Tahiti and New Zealand are among the places where Polynesians settled several centuries ago.
To make a true general statement about the natives of all these islands would be hard. The natives differ widely, and many of them are of mixed blood.
In the case of the Hawaiians, a great mixture of people has taken place, with a large number being partly Japanese, Chinese or Filipino. Hardly one-tenth of the population can be called
