

Lima Gets Early Showing Of Hit, 'A Song To Remember'

Many great motion pictures fall naturally into certain categorical pigeon-holes—a director's picture, a star's picture or the cameraman's. Such a film is the technicolor production, "A Song To Remember" opening Friday at the Quilna theatre and starring Paul Muni and Merle Oberon and featuring Cornel Wilde. The film tells the story of two great influences on the life of the famous composer-pianist, Frederic Chopin, Professor Joseph Elsner, his music master, and the famous woman novelist, George Sands.

Governors of the 48 states, prison associations and parole boards—all are writing to the studio which produced the picture. "I'll Be Seeing You" now showing at the Ohio theatre either to protest or to approve the picture. The whole question of furloughing prisoners in state institutions for Christmas holidays is given an airing in the film.

New York acclaimed it as the picture which turned the frigid north into a torrid zone—just what it will do to Lima, no one knows until it arrives. The picture "Belle of the Yukon" with Randolph Scott, Gypsy Rose Lee and Dinah Shore will open Saturday at the Sigma theatre. The picture is in technicolor.

There are many aspects which make the picture "Murder, My Sweet" starring Dick Powell, Claire Trevor and Anne Shirley, stand out from the usual run of mystery dramas. The average fictional sleuth is infallible in his reasoning, outwits his quarry at all points, and rarely, if ever, gets his hair mussed in the process. In this picture, now showing at the State theatre, the tables are turned.

Social Training Plan Outlined

CLEVELAND, Apr. 13—(AP)—Inauguration of an experiment in training young Americans for rehabilitation work in Europe awaits only formal approval of local authorities.

This Guy Took Income Tax Law At Its Meaning

CLEVELAND, Apr. 13—(UP)—A Cleveland movie operator today was a leading candidate for Secretary of Treasury Henry Morgenthau's personal public enemy No. 1.

The man, who must be unidentified because income tax returns are confidential, decided that it was too much trouble to figure out his tax himself, so he took advantage of a law and sent in his withholding slips.

That, in itself, wouldn't be so bad. But this particular guy—because of the profession he pursued—got paid every night. And he got a withholding slip with each pay-day. He accumulated 366 slips this way since last year's last pay day.

The revenue bureau put the slips thru some 50 separate operations and a staff of employes spent a week figuring out the return.

Thomas M. Carey, revenue collector here, said he hopes the guy will file his income tax return somewhere else next year.

DOGS QUARANTINED

ELYRIA, O., Apr. 13—(AP)—The Lorain-co board of health has ordered a quarantine, beginning Monday, on all dogs in the county, excluding the cities of Elyria and Lorain. The order, aimed at preventing the spread of rabies from adjoining counties, makes it mandatory for owners to have their dogs under control at all times.

Nazi General To Face Death

LONDON, Apr. 13—(UP)—The German high command reported today that General Lasch, who surrendered at Koenigsberg, had been sentenced to death by hanging.

The Nazis yesterday branded Lasch a coward for giving up to the Russians at the end of the week-long siege of Koenigsberg, capital of East Prussia.

Moscow had announced the capture of Lasch. The death sentence apparently was imposed in absentia as a token implementation of a new decree by Gestapo Chief Heinrich Himmler providing the extreme penalty under such circumstances.

IRONTON, O., Apr. 13—(AP)—City Manager Ralph Mitterdorf told members of the Rotary club at an election meeting last night that this city faces a deficit of \$25,000 unless new means of revenue are found in 1947.

Tungsten Ore Plant To Be Constructed

NEW MARTINSVILLE, W. Va., Apr. 13—(AP)—A \$6,000,000 factory described as the largest tungsten ore reducing plant in the world, will be built within a short time at Natrium, near here, the War department announced today.

The Bureau of Public Relations, in making the announcement, said the plant would be erected near the chlorine plant of the Pittsburgh Plate Glass Co. at Natrium, eight miles from New Martinsville on the Ohio river.

The carbonyl ordnance division of the Carbonyl Co., Inc., will operate the plant for the government, the announcement said, in producing tungsten carbide artillery projectile cores. Carbonyl already is making the same product in its plant at Detroit, Mich.

"Bingo Law" Is Under Attack

COLUMBUS, O., Apr. 13—(AP)—The so-called "bingo law," an off-spring of the 1943-44 legislature, has returned to haunt the new general assembly.

Sen. George G. Shurtz (R of Newcomerstown, a chaplain, wants it amended.

"The 95th (1943-44) general assembly passed legislation," he told the senate judiciary committee last night, "which has, as I see it, violated the intent of the constitution."

The constitution prohibits lotteries and the sale of lottery tickets "for any purpose whatsoever."

The enactment to which Senator Shurtz objects has been interpreted as indirectly legalizing bingo and similar games of chance conducted by an organization for charity, although it was designed primarily to specify heavy penalties for racketeers such as "numbers" house operators.

It provides that a person, to be in violation of the law against gambling, must conduct a scheme of chance "for his own profit." Shurtz proposes that "for his own profit" be deleted.

Lawyer To Keep Divorce Pledge

FORT SMITH, Ark., Apr. 13—(INS)—E. M. Ditmon, a Fort Smith attorney, was paying today for a jocular remark he made 23 years ago.

To his office the other day came a woman who informed him she wished to sue for divorce. Ditmon agreed to take the case but tactfully led up to the little matter of fee. His suggestion brought this response:

"Why, Mr. Ditmon, don't you remember when you were a justice of the peace and married us 23 years ago? You said at the time you'd get me a divorce free if I ever wanted one. Well, I want one."

Ditmon, with no fee in sight, was getting the papers ready today.

Allies Holding Aerial Power

NINTH AIRFORCE HEAD-QUARTERS, France, Apr. 13—(AP)—Gen. H. H. Arnold, chief of American air forces, said today Allied planes "now can fly over Germany at any time and in any kind of weather."

At a press conference after a week's inspection tour of the western front, Arnold said it "looks like the German air force has lost its will to fight aggressively. It is no longer mobile because of the lack of fuel."

He said that March was our biggest month yet in the air with a daily average of more than 5,000 planes in the air, and a total of 168,000 sorties (individual plane flights) for the month.

Casualties At 898,749 Total

WASHINGTON, Apr. 13—(INS)—Casualties reported by the armed services today totalled 898,749, an increase of only 5,910 above last week's figure, in contrast to recent weekly increases of 15,000 or more.

The reduced increase was due largely to the fact that War department figures showed an overall increase of only 4,302. These figures actually represent only casualties whose names were reported in the four days ending Mar. 31. Last week's War department casualties included all names received in Washington thru Mar. 27.

The low figure was further explained by the fact that the list of soldiers reported missing in action declined 2,107 from last week's total of 88,755.
