to 30 inches. The great horned owl and the great gray owl have a wingspread of five feet. There are, however, many owls of small size. These include the burrowing owl, the elf owl and the pygmy owl.

The pygmy owl is, indeed, a small bird. It is only seven inches long when full grown. Compare that with the length of a robin—from eight to ten inches, counting the tail.

Pygmy owls are found on the western side of North America, from British Columbia down to Mexico. Some make their homes in Montana, Colorado, New Mexico and Utah. They like mountains.

Usually a pygmy owl makes its nest in a hollow in the trunk of a fir, pine or cedar tree. The height of the hollow may be from eight to 75 feet. An old and deserted woodpecker's hole is a favorite place for this bird to build its nest.

In 1861 a traveler in southern California saw an even smaller owl than the pygmy. He was in the Mojave desert when he caught sight of a little brown owl with a black-and-white collar on its neck. It was only about six inches long, hardly larger than a sparrow.

Since that time, many other owls of the same family have been seen and studied. They are larger than the elf or pygmy. Its body bulges out more than that of a robin, but it is about the same length as an average robin.

Burrowing owls make their nests under the ground, often using holes left by prairie dogs, badgers or foxes.
