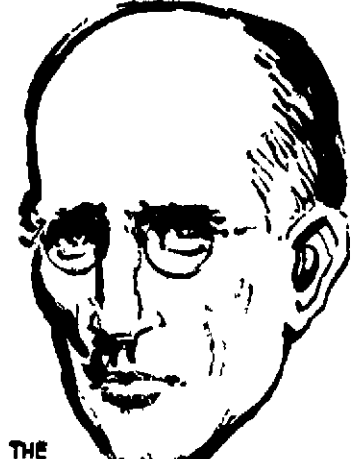

Your GI Rights

Questions and Answers On Servicemen's Problems

WASHINGTON, May 17.—Here are some general questions from relatives and dependents of men in service.

Q. My daughter's husband was killed in action in Europe. They had no children and no money put away for an emergency. Exactly what benefits will she get from the Government?

A. She will receive \$50 a month death compensation until she remarries and six months gratuity pay equal to his last military pay and insurance payments if he had National Service Life Insurance with her named as beneficiary.

Q. My husband was reported killed in an air raid over Japan. He had a \$10,000 National Service

Life Insurance made out to me. I am under 30 years of age and they tell me I have the option of receiving two kinds of payments. What are these options and will payments stop if I re-marry?

A. The first option is to receive \$51.10 per month for 240 months. Or you can get monthly payments for life with reduced payments. In the event of your death under the second option, payments will be continued to a secondary beneficiary until the total value of the policy has been paid. The secondary beneficiary must be either one of the children, parents, brother or sister of your deceased husband.

Q. Is mustering out pay due the widow of a serviceman?

A. If a man has already been discharged from the service but hasn't received all his mustering out payments before he dies, the balance will be paid the widow. If a man dies in service, relatives, dependents or heirs have no claim to it.

Q. My son was in the army a little less than a month when he strained his back while lifting packages of food. He was discharged a week later and now wants to go to college under the GI Bill of Rights. He didn't serve the necessary 60 days. Is he eligible for GI Bill benefits?

A. Yes. Although he served less than 60 days it is apparent from your question that he received a medical discharge. That makes him eligible for the GI benefits.

Purple Heart Is Awarded Lima Vet

Pfc. Ralph Schoonover, 24, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Schoonover, 869 E. High-st., has been awarded the Purple Heart for wounds sustained April 4 in the Philippine Islands, the War department has informed his parents.

A graduate of Central high school, Pfc. Schoonover was inducted into military service Aug. 21, 1941, and trained at Camp Wolters, Tex. He went overseas in November, 1941.

Prior to entering the service, he was employed at the Lennox Furnace Co.

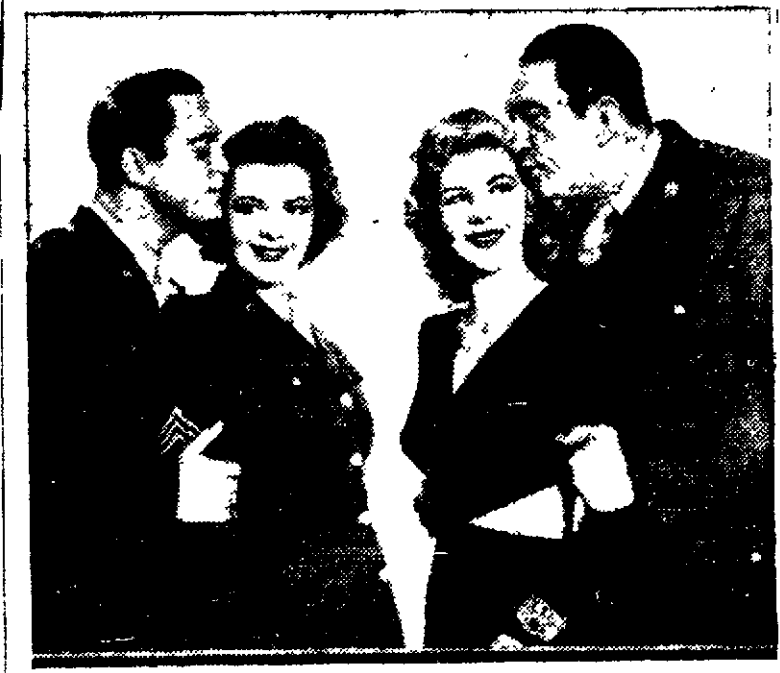

Reds Urge Nazi Business Plans

MOSCOW, May 26.—(AP)—The Red army command in Russian occupied Germany today re-established free trade and the profit system and encouraged surplus to sell or barter their surplus produce on the open market in a move to combat the serious threat of famine in the cities.

The new decrees, together with the establishment of a food ration in Berlin and Dresden greater than that the Germans had under Hitler in the last days of the war, was reported to have made a deep impression on the German people.

German reaction was summed up in a letter to the Red army command. "Marshal Stalin is more concerned over the German people than was the former government of Germany."

PARK IS RENAMED FOR COWBOY-ARTIST

GREAT FALLS, Mont., May 26.—(UP)—Margaret Park, named in 1896 for Margaret Harkness of St. Louis, who supposedly was the first white woman to see the upper falls of the Missouri river, has been renamed in honor of Charles M. Russell, Great Falls' famed cowboy-artist.

A memorial to Russell will be erected in the park to display and store the paintings, models and other items which have celebrated him as a renowned artist and philosopher of Montana.

NEW METHOD PREVENTS RUST

Girls Process Equipment For Seabees

(By International News Service) CLEARFIELD, Utah, May 26.—(INS)—Girls in the navy supply depot at Clearfield, Utah, tie a glass fiber around a gear, dip it in the "soup" and let it drip for a few seconds, hang it on a hook, and in less than a minute it's cool and dry.

Out on Island X, Sammy Seabeed needs a gear to put his bulldozer back in running condition at once. He grabs the piece of equipment the girls processed some weeks earlier, pulls the string and the whole protective coat peels off as smoothly as a banana skin.

As simple as that has American ingenuity cracked one of the toughest bottlenecks in getting supplies to our men on the fighting fronts, by developing a simple one-step process of preserving spare repair parts against rust and other forms of corrosion.

The new process employs a plastic dip compounded of thylcolulose and other materials to coat nearly all items with a "perfect" preservative less than one-tenth of an inch thick.

The plastic "soup" contains just enough oil to make peeling possible and to leave a fine rust-preventing coat on the part. To take off the "banana skin" wrapping, a glass fiber string is used rather than cotton, since the latter would absorb moisture.

Preliminary studies indicate the new process will cut from 62 per cent to 90 per cent in packaging time, and it saves huge quantities of paper and cushioning materials, too, for none are needed.

A ceiling projector, a five-mile-beam of light, has been developed which makes it a simple matter to determine the heights of cloud ceilings anywhere from ceiling zero to 28,000 feet.
