Uncle Ray's Corner
CRESTS ON HELMETS SET KNIGHTS APART DURING TOURNAMENTS
A family crest is a picture or design which is a special symbol. Many crests have been used in Great Britain and on the mainland of Europe, down to this time. Such a crest may be found now and then in North America, but less often than on the other side of the Atlantic.
In modern times crests have been placed on silverware, and on the uniforms of footmen and other servants. They have been painted on coaches, even on automobiles. We will make a list of crests that these crests come from."
The answer is that many of them go back to the knights of the Middle Ages. Even if they do not go back that far, the idea sprang from an old custom followed by knights. When knights rode forth in their shining armor, it was common for them to carry crests of one kind or another on their helmets. One might have the figure of an eagle resting on his helmet. Another might have a lion or some other animal there. Even before the Middle Ages opened in Europe, there were Greek and Roman soldiers who wore crests. These were plumes of feathers or tufts of hair which were fastened to their helmets. With the coming of the days of armored knights, a special reason arose for wearing crests. Helmets were made with a face covering, and it was hard, if not impossible, to tell who was wearing them. To meet this problem, a knight was likely to use his own special type of crest when he went into battle or into a tournament. Crests were worn more often in tournaments, when crowds were watching, than in actual fighting on the battlefield. Wood was used in making some of the crests for knights. Other crests were made of leather. Leopards were among the animals most often chosen for crests. Fire-breathing dragons of a blow on the head. That may also appeared as crests, and so did have been a reason for wearing foxes and wolves. Now and then a crest helped to set one knight apart from another a knight from the full force of other.
