TEACHERS APPOINTED
GRANVILLE, O., June 23 — (AP) — The following appointments to the Denison university faculty were announced today by President Kenneth L. REGISTER TO VOTE!

The United States is one of the few countries in the world today where men and women can vote for their representatives in public office.

Thus the opportunity that Americans have of going to the polls on Election Day and freely marking their ballots for candidates of their own selection is both a sacred and exclusive privilege and one which should be exercised by every man and woman who is eligible to vote.

Citizens of the United States, 21 years of age or more, and those who will become 21 years of age before the election, November 6th, 1945, who have resided in the State of Ohio for one year, in Allen County for thirty days, and in the precinct for twenty-eight days, may register, and vote on Election Day.

Register: Electors who failed to vote at the last two November General Elections must register to vote at the Primary Election, July 31st, 1945, as well as persons who have recently moved into the city, and those who have changed their names by marriage or court order.

Transfer: Electors who have changed their residence since the last election must transfer.

Monday, July 2nd, 1945, is the deadline for registration and transfers at the Board of Elections. The offices of the Board of Elections are in the basement of the Allen County Court House, and they will accept Registrations and Transfers daily from 8:00 o'clock A. M., to 4:00 o'clock P. M., Saturday afternoons and Sundays, excepted.

Don't throw away your chance to vote by failing to register. Make sure you are qualified to vote, so that you can go to the polls on July 31st, 1945, and nominate the candidates you wish to vote for at the General Election to be held November 6th, 1945.

Questions and Answers On Servicemen's Problems

WASHINGTON, June 23 — Here are some questions on veterans' priority for surplus property:

Q. My brother and I own a dry goods store. There have been many requests for work clothes which are hard to get. I understand that some work clothes have been declared surplus property and inasmuch as I am a veteran I would like to know how I can get these items using my priority.

A. You cannot get any surplus property under veterans' priority if you plan to resell it. Of course you can get it thru the regular channels. Your priority is only for goods that will go directly into maintaining or setting up the business.

Q. My buddy and I are planning to open up a tavern. We know of some refrigerating equipment we need which is Government surplus property, but it costs \$3000. They tell us you can only get items \$2500 or less on a veterans' priority. We are both veterans. Is this true?

A. One veteran is entitled to priority for surplus goods up to \$2500. That means that two of you could buy up to \$5000 worth. Therefore you can buy the refrigerating equipment you need.

Q. I saw a list of items which

have been declared surplus property by the Government recently. I could use several of the things on the list to fix up my home which is in need of repair since I have been in the Army. How do I go about getting priority for these things?

A. You can't get priority for surplus property unless you use it in your business or on a farm.

Q. I understand the Government has a lot of excess stuff it is selling cheap. Some of it I could use in my business. Where can I get a list of just what the Government has and how much it costs?

A. Write to the nearest office of the Smaller War Plants Corp., if you are going to use it in business or War Food Administration (for farm goods).
