Uncle Ray's Corner
Natives of Celebes Use Rattans to Make Bridges Over Streams

Between Borneo and New Guinea there is an island of very odd shape. It is known as Celebes, the name being pronounced "SELL-eh-bees". Celebes is made up of four peninsulas which come together, its greatest length is about 800 miles. If you try to find a point far from the coast, you will have a hard time. Nowhere can you reach a place which is as much as 70 miles from the sea.

Many mountains rise on Celebes, but none of them are tall enough to be covered with snow. This is a jungle country, and trees and bushes grow on all the mountains. It is dangerous to fall over a cliff anywhere, but if you must do that you might choose Celebes as a place for the accident. The mountains have sheer cliffs which drop 800 feet or more.

The faces of the cliffs are covered with plant life. If you fall over the brink of one of them, your fall would be broken, and very likely you could cling to a strong bush or tree. Then, if you were strong enough, you might climb back up the face of the cliff to your starting point, holding to limbs or branches along the way.

Rivers flow between many of the cliffs. Natives often build rattan bridges over the rivers. These are made with the help of strong strands of rattan, from one to two inches thick. Several of these strands are tied to trees on either side of the stream, and then serve as a bridge. Now and then we may find a rattan sus-ber of the swine family. The much curved, they really are male babirusa has tusks which grow from its upper jaw up through the skin between the eyes and snout! (See TRAVEL section of your eyes and snout! These tusks are sharp.)

over Celebes nearly all the time. In 1942 the island was overrun by soldiers of Japan.

Classed as one of the Dutch East Indies, Celebes is a little larger than the six New England states together. Yet it has only about one fourth the area of Borneo.
