'30-Day' Official of RFC Quits After 13 Years

WASHINGTON—(U.P.)—Howard J. Klossner, former St. Paul, Minn., banker who came to Washington for a 30-day stay and remained for 13 years, has resigned as a director of the Reconstruction Finance Corp., the White House announced Tuesday.

The White House made public an exchange of letters between Klossner and Pres. Truman in which Klossner asked that he be released in order that he may return to private industry. Klossner's resignation is effective today.

"On Mar. 28, 1932, I came to Washington for a period of 30 days, surely not longer than 60 days, to assist the Reconstruction Finance Corp., in getting started," Klossner's letter said. "After this period I was requested to continue and on Apr. 27, 1937, Pres. Roosevelt appointed me a director of the corporation in which capacity I have served ever since."

The president praised Klossner for his "fifteen and efficient services" and said he had no alternative but to accept the resignation.

Triplets Born at Waukesha

WAUKESHA, Wis.—(U.P.)—Triplets, two boys and a girl, were born to Mr. and Mrs. Frank Barton, Waukesha, Sunday. The Bartons have six other children between the ages of 4½ and 19.

The boys, who have been named Larry Gene and Lilwellyn Karl, weighed 5 pounds each and their sister, Loretta Jane, 4 pounds, 14½ ounces.

Dr. F. G. Zietlow, who advised Mrs. Barton to expect triplets, said the mother and the three children were doing well. Barton is an employee of the shipping department of the Waukesha Motor works.
