**Uncle Ray's Corner**  
**BEETLE FAMILY HOLDS VERY LARGE INSECTS, ALSO SMALL ONES**  
 Summer is the time when insects are seen in greatest number. So it may be well, on this August day, to look at the insect world in a general way.  
 In the first place let us note that insects are classed as members of the animal world. Some persons think of animals as being only those which have fur on their backs. Yet frogs and lizards surely are animals, and so are fish and birds. Scientists, and the men who make dictionaries, also speak of insects as "animals."  
 There are so many kinds of insects that it is hard to make a statement which will fit all of them. We may say, however, that an insect has six legs. You will find this true of a grasshopper, of a housefly, of a bee and so on.  
 Spiders fit to fit that rule. They have eight legs apiece. Partly because of this fact, spiders are classed as "arachnids," instead of insects.  
 Besides its six legs, an insect almost always has wings when it grows to its adult stage. In many cases there are only two wings are grown. A fly, for example, has only one pair of wings.  
 In certain insect families, wings are rare. Most ants move about by crawling. Yet there are winged-ants. Male ants have wings, and so do some of the queens. The great majority of ants are workers, however, and the workers fail to grow wings.  
 Fleas are insects, but they never grow wings. They have won their chief fame by their ability to hop.  
 One great division of the insect tribe is made up of beetles. There are thousands of kinds of beetles, and they differ a great deal in size. The beetles include some of the smallest and some of the largest of all insects.  
 Feather-winged beetles are the smallest beetles. Some of them are smaller than the head of a pin, but they have neat little wings and can fly.  
 The beetle family also contains members which are near the top sizes in size among all insects. I am thinking of the Hercules beetles which are found in the West Indies and Venezuela. These big insects may reach a length of six inches or a bit more.
