Extended Search For Bombs Hinted

SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 17—(AP)—The wind-wafted, bomb-carrying balloons Japan sent to America may keep searching parties busy long after the last shot is fired in the Pacific, authorities believe.

The problem now, they said, is to prevent injury or damage from bombs undiscovered.

Under consideration is a plan to send search parties to the scene of each bomb find and have them work back over the assumed bomb route, aided by meteorological data on prevailing winds.

Approximately 230 were found during the war, scattered from Alaska to Mexico. How many might have fallen unnoticed, their bombs unexploded, cannot be guessed.

A flight of hundreds was sighted off the Aleutians during the San Francisco United Nations conference, but not one was known to have reached shore.

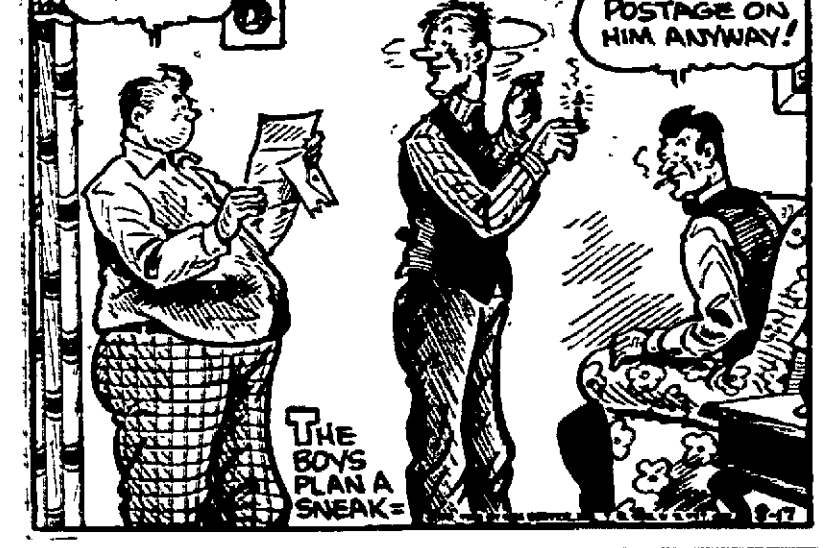

Novelist Lauds Atomic Bombs

OXFORD, England, Aug. 17—(AP)—St. John Ervine, novelist and dramatist, deplored today what he called the "trash and twaddle" in arguments about atomic bombs.

"I would rather be killed by an atomic bomb than by a rusty bayonet thrust into my intestines," he told the conference of modern churchmen.

"Let us be reasonable about this thing. Do not let us forget that two atomic bombs stopped the war, that vast multitudes of men and women have been saved from death and disease, and that the world is now able to begin a process of recovering much quicker than it might have done."

Regulation Of Labor Unions Held Necessary

CLEVELAND, Aug. 17—(AP)—An appeal for federal regulation of labor unions because of the "irresponsibility" of many labor organizations has been issued by Donald R. Richberg, former general counsel of the National Recovery Administration.

"There is only one way in which a labor peace program can be made to succeed," Richberg told the Associated Industries of Cleveland yesterday. "That is to write the obligations of the parties into law and to make them enforceable."

Richberg, one of the authors of the Ball-Burton-Hatch bill, known as the federal industrial relations act, declared:

"Labor power in the United States has become so great that governmental restrictions against labor dictation are as necessary as those long ago found necessary to prevent dictation by monopolists of transportation, or electric power, or financial power."

"The irresponsibility of many labor unions increases the need for public regulations."

Alarm Voiced Over Jap Talk

LONDON, Aug. 17—(AP)—The Times and The Yorkshire Post expressed alarm today at the tone of Japanese broadcasts informing the people of their defeat.

Quoting such Japanese statements as "we have lost, but this is temporary" and "our mistake was lack of material strength and necessary scientific knowledge and equipment"—this mistake we must amend," the Times said.

"Such passages x x x afford evidence of a frame of mind of which the Allies cannot fail to take the most careful notice."

The Yorkshire Post detected in Emperor Hirohito's speech "a double meaning" and called it "in fact an apology of that regime which is now supposed to have come to an end."

Pelicans Caused Air Raid Alert

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 17—(INS)—A 61-minute air raid alert in the San Francisco bay area on June 27, 1943, was caused by a "whole flock of pelicans."

As part of the now-it-can-be-told stories of the war, the pelican incident proved the efficiency of radar in detecting the approach of possible enemy airplanes.

It can be disclosed with the lifting of military censorship that radar can detect a single pelican at sea. Two years ago in June the flock of pelicans was picked up by radar and set in motion the Pacific coast's elaborate air raid defense system.

Because of secrecy surrounding the employment of radar at that stage of the war, the Army could merely announce at the time that the targets "disappeared"

Police Delayed Surrender Note

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17—(UP)—The Japanese surrender note was held up for 10 minutes on its way to the White House while a policeman hawled out two race messengers for a minor traffic violation.

The messengers, 16-year-old Thomas Jones and former S. Sgt. Earl Allison, 26, a veteran of the Flying Tiers, were rushing the note by car to the Swiss legation when Officer Harold W. Dixon drove up in a scout car and stopped them on charges of making an illegal U-turn.

The messengers said they explained they were carrying news for which the whole world was waiting but the policeman said it made "no difference to him."

"He held us for 10 minutes," Allison said. "He gave us a ticket. He was rough on us, spoke harshly, warned us not to make speed. We got to the legation as soon as possible, however."
